THE DEWAR CUP COMES BACK TO THE STATES

American Riflemen Defeat Great Britain by Forty-one Points - U. S. Men Make Possible 500.

Washington, June 20 - Beating Great Britain by forty-one points, the United States has won the International shooting match just completed, and recaptured the Dewar cup.

This was the first of the many International rifle shooting matches in which the United States will compete during the present year.

Last year Great Britain took the Dewar cup from the United States, winning the small bore match by 257 points. The score at that time was Great Britain 24,548, United States 24,291.

Before the Public Utilities Commission yesterday morning the application of the New Brunswick Telephone Company for permission to put the Rothersey exchange in Class C or D and put a minimum toll rate of two cents on calls to and from St. John was heard.

Representatives of the Rothersey subscribers were present, in protest against the change. Decision in the case was reserved.

Commissioners G. O. D. O'Leary, A. B. Connell and Felix Michaud, Secretary F. D. Robinson, J. B. M. Baxter, W. A. Ewing and A. W. Bentley, representing the New Brunswick Telephone Company, H. F. Puddington and A. H. Hanington, representing the Rothersey telephone subscribers, O. J. Fraser and H. P. Robinson, of the New Brunswick Telephone Company, were present.

H. P. Robinson said Newcastle and Chatham exchanges were in the same position as it was desired to put St. John and Rothersey.

The Rothersey subscribers held that Rothersey exchange should be included in the St. John exchange.

SCHOONERS AND STEAMERS ASHORE-PACKET SCHR. LOST. Steamer Sold By Auction - Thousands of Russians for Canada-Dynamite Schooner Ashore-Recent Charters

STEAMER SOLD BY AUCTION. United States Marshal Henry W. Mayo sold by auction at Bucksport on Tuesday afternoon the steamer Tremont, which has been tied up there for quite a while. Capt. F. C. Penfold of Ialeboro, was the purchaser.

ASHORE AND FLOATED. Steamer Monksaven, Captain Milburn, from Las Palmas, which arrived at Gullport, Tuesday, reports stranded on a shoal off Dry Tortugas, June 13, floated off without assistance and without apparent damage; survey held and seaworthy certificate given.

LOADS AT HALIFAX. Steamer Louisiana will proceed from Boston to Halifax to load deals for United Kingdom.

SCHOONERS DRAGGED. During a high wind Wednesday at Mobile, the schooner M. J. Taylor dragged her anchor and fouled the schooner M. A. Achorn, damaging her considerably.

BOUND FOR CANADA. Steamship Patricia docked at Halifax Thursday morning from Hamburg. She brought out 2100 passengers, of whom 1170 were bound to the United States. By far the greater majority of the passengers are Russians and Austrians.

STEAMER ASHORE. Gulfport, Miss., June 18 - Str Monksaven (Br), Milburn, from Las Palmas, which arrived here today, reports stranded on a shoal off Dry Tortugas, June 13, floated off without assistance and without apparent damage; survey held and seaworthy certificate given.

HAD DYNAMITE CARGO. Seattle, June 13 - Schr Dupont (owned by Dupont Powder Co), struck a pile in east waterway this morning and sank; she was later floated with a hole in hull; the schooner had a cargo of dynamite aboard.

FLOATED BY CUTTER. Vineyard Haven, Mass., June 18 - Schr Regina, Sanborn, Machias for Wareham, with lumber, ran ashore on Great Point Rip, Nantucket Shoals yesterday morning during heavy weather. Revenue cutter Acushnet floated her at 8 a. m., leaking so badly that her pumps could not free her and the Acushnet towed her to destination.

THE EMPRESS STEAMERS. The S. S. Empress of Japan arrived at Yokohama on June 18th, between 8 and 10 a. m. The S. S. Empress of Britain, from Montreal, June 11th, arrived at Liverpool on Thursday at 9 p. m.

DANGERS TO NAVIGATION. New York, June 19 - Strm Kaiser Franz Josef I (Aust), from Trieste, on June 18, at 11, lat 42 42, lon 22 16, passed a red cylindrical buoy.

Str Corozal reports June 8, Sand Key Lighthouse, bearing N 58 deg E (true), about 8 miles distant, passed a tree stump about 30 feet long covered with marine growth with one end projecting about 4 feet out of water.

Str Ben Lomond (Br), reports June 15, lat 24 43 N, lon 82 56 W, passed a log about 30 feet long and 3 feet in diameter, covered with marine growth.

Str Lancastrian (Br), reports June 7, lat 42 24 N, lon 44 14 W, passed a log about 40 feet long and 3 feet square covered with marine growth; same date, lat 42 55, lon 42 06 passed a large and a small iceberg.

Str Celtic (Br), reports June 2, lat 43 47 N, lon 49 15 W, passed a spar about 22 feet long and 2 feet in diameter covered with marine growth.

Str Scotia (Br), reports no ice June 15, lat 51 45, lon 48 30, and 16th, lat 51 15, lon 49 30; June 17, an iceberg, lat 50 45, lon 52 30.

Arrived here on Saturday last from Newport News, is still lying at the Maine Central wharf with 1300 tons on board yet unsold.

THOUSAND BUSHELS OF SALT. Portland, Me., June 20 - Something like 100,000 bushels of salt is booked to arrive here during the month of July. In addition to the Italian bark Santa Maria, now on the way from Trapani, which port she left on May 4 with about 1300 tons of salt, for the W. H. Shurtliff Co, the Lord Brothers have just chartered two vessels, the barkentine Mabel I Meyers and the schooner Elizabeth Gilbert, to load salt at Turis Island. Both are expected to reach here the latter part of July, the Mabel with about 30,000 bushels, the schooner having about 22,000.
