Annual Meeting of Brandram Henderson

Net Earnings for Year Were \$300,000 and Assets Now Amount to More Than Three Quarters of a Million

The annual meeting of Brandram Henderson, Limited, was held at Halifax on Thursday, the 26th. This company has had another extraordinarily successful year, the net earnings being \$299,736.31 as compared with \$236,133.32 in the previous year. The year's earnings added to the balance of Profit and Loss carried forward from the previous year, amounting to \$501,619, and a special reserve of \$28,000 for depreciation against a contingency which was apprehended in the last re-

port, but which did not occur, brought the total available for distribution up to \$821,556. This amount was distributed as follows:—
Bond interest paid and accrued \$50,799
Dividends on Preferred Stock . . . 35,000
Dividends on Common Stock . . . 38,800
Reserve for Depreciation . . . 20,000
Sinking Fund for Redemption of Bonds . . . 18,000
War Tax . . . 19,629
making a total of \$182,228 and leaving a balance to be carried forward to credit of Profit and Loss of \$639,328, against \$501,619 at the end of the previous year.

An examination of the general statement of assets and liabilities shows the company has now worked itself into an exceedingly strong position, as the total current assets amount to \$1,610,703, as against current liabilities of only \$339,410. The principal items in current assets include Merchandise \$1,059,968 and Accounts Receivable \$529,680. Current liabilities are made up chiefly of Accounts Payable \$233,138 and Bills Payable \$10,182. There is a marked decrease in current liabilities, which last year amounted to \$802,622. This is due to the liquidation of the "Bank of Montreal" which last year appeared as \$444,706. This has been accomplished and other important advantages secured by the issue of \$1,250,000 20-year 6 per cent Consolidated Mortgage Sinking Fund Gold Bonds, of which \$650,000 were sold during the past year.

MOVE TO RESTORE HAPSBURG REGIME

Ex-Emperor Charles Has Been Offered the Hungarian Crown.

Geneva, March 26.—(By The A. P.)—Admiral Horthy, the regent of Hungary has secretly but officially offered the Hungarian Throne to former Emperor Charles, with the assurance that everything has been arranged for the return of the Hapsburg monarchy, with the consent of the majority of the population, according to information from Prangins, where the ex-Emperor lives.

Admiral Horthy, it is declared, has invited the former ruler to come to Budapest as soon as possible, adding that the question with the Allies in connection with the move can best be arranged at the Hungarian capital.

The ex-Emperor, however, is said to be apparently hesitating as to his course, and has not left Prangins.

BLACK LAKE ASBESTOS

Toronto, March 26.—The local street is freely discussing the Black Lake Asbestos situation and the personal nature of the contest thereof reflected. The view is taken that interests connected with Sir Mortimer Davis are in the Black Lake contest in opposition to J. A. Jacobs, of Montreal, this being a continuation of the differences which manifested themselves in the Jacobs Asbestos Co., the name of which was recently changed to the Consolidated Asbestos Company.

The statement is made that Sir Mortimer Davis and his associates have acquired large blocks of Black Lake Asbestos in consequence of which Mr. Jacobs is out of the running for control, on the lines of his recent offer to the directors. Buying by the Davis interests is believed to have been responsible for putting the common stock above \$16, as compared with the Jacobs offer of \$12.

COMPANY REPORTS

Montreal, March 26.—Initial dividend of 1 1/4 per cent for quarter ending March 31st, payable April 1st to record March 31st, has been declared by directors of Consolidated Asbestos Limited of which Sir Mortimer Davis is chairman and Sir John Carson, President and Managing Director. The gross earnings of Montreal Light, Heat and Power Co., Ltd., were \$1,081,800 in January, a gain of \$17,244, compared with January 1919 net \$638,655 increase \$2,692, surplus \$448,496, increase \$2,202. December earnings were also ahead of those of previous December and similar results are looked for from February.

Police Court Cases Yesterday

Several Prisoners Were Remanded — Case Against Members of S.S. Scotian for Selling Liquor Was Concluded.

In the police court yesterday two men were charged with drunkenness and remanded, another with a more serious offense was also remanded, the rest of the day was taken up with liquor charges preferred against different members of the crew of the C. P. O. S. Scotian.

The case of John Mitchell, charged with having liquor in his possession on the voyage from Antwerp was resumed. The accused said he got a demijohn of liquor in Southampton and the bottles and capsules from the ship's bar.

Francis Durasse, Jules Cappare and Joseph Bussene were charged with acting together and selling liquor. Durasse claimed he had sold but one bottle. After the evidence had been heard C. F. Inches, who appeared for the prosecution, asked that the maximum fine be struck against the men, as the very fact of their having invested over fifteen pounds in liquor showed that a minimum fine would be a mere tagetelle to them.

John Fischer a steward pleaded guilty to being absent from his ship without leave. He said he came ashore in the interests of the men and was prepared to pay a fine to which he was liable to. His Honor promised to consider the evidence and give sentence today. The captain of the ship said that owing to the liquor the accused had sold during the voyage the life of the steamer passengers had been in a veritable hell and no penalty could be too stiff in order to make an example of the men. If this was not done the habit would spread. He considered Fischer the ring leader. The judge said he could readily see that something must be done to check the modern Bolshevik and Socialist ideas which were even making their way on board ship so that even the captain's orders were being refused by the men.

SUPREME COURT HAS ADJOURNED FOR EASTER

And Judgments in the Board of Commerce Cases Stand Over.

Ottawa, March 26.—The Supreme Court of Canada adjourned tonight until April 6, without handing down judgments in the two Boards of Commerce cases argued in the court last week.

The judgments will decide the status of the Board of Commerce as a price fixing tribunal and its power to compel the marketing of commodities at fixed prices and fix penalties for the infringement of its orders.

The first case will decide whether Parliament had power to create the Board of Commerce vesting in it such powers as are challenged. In the second case, which was brought by the newspaper manufacturing firm of Price Bros. & Company to question the constitutionality of an order of the Board of Commerce, restricting the export to the United States of newspapers from the mills in Quebec and ordering Price Bros. to sell newspapers at a fixed price in specified quantities to specified firms in Montreal. The question of provincial rights, it is argued, is vitally affected in the decision.

WALES TO GET LOCAL OPTION

London, March 26.—A bill which was to give local option to Wales passed its second reading in the House of Commons today 86 to 84.

Lady Astor was active in the debate on the measure, explaining that she considered local option a principle of democracy. When asked to reconcile her activity for the bill with her campaign statement, "I am not a prohibitionist," Lady Astor replied:

Whole of the speech in which she made the statement should be quoted to convey just what she had meant.

Herbert H. Asquith, former Premier, also supported the measure. The bill is much the same as the one which had been effective in Scotland for the past six years.
