Hives may be placed in boxes for outdoor wintering before or after feeding at the convenience of the beekeeper, but winter packing should be applied before settled cold weather. For cellar wintering, hives should be placed in the cellar at freezing up time in November, selecting for the operation if possible a cold day immediately following a spell of warm weather. When properly prepared according to some method similar to those described in Bulletin 255 on "The Wintering of Bees in Ontario," outdoor wintered bees require no attention from the time the feeding and packing is completed until the following April. The bee-cellar should be watched for the regulation of temperature and ventilation when changes of weather occur.
