GUELPH, March 27.—Guelph post office employees have drafted a petition to be forwarded to Premier Meighen protesting strongly against the proposed cut of 25 per cent in the high cost of living bonus they have been receiving. This action was taken at a joint meeting of the postal clerks and letter-carriers held last night. As in other cities throughout the provin other cities throughout the province, the local postoffice staff are protesting against the bonus reduction on the grounds that the cost of living has not reduced anything like 25 per cent. The bonuses received by the employees at the local postoffice range from \$60 to \$420 per annum, according to length of service with the department.




