My dear Eugene:

Please do not bother about the "New York Times." What I had in mind, though perhaps I did not make it clear, was that you might write the letter and have some friend of yours sign it. It would never do to have it transable to me in any way. However, likely what you say is correct and the subject is dead already.

I wonder if Mr. Stitt would tell
you who that Press Gallery man was. As I feel now—
and I don't think I will change—I will demand an apology
from him if I can get his name. I would like also to know
if Mr. Stitt knows of anyone else to whom he has made this
statement. The statement is libellous and even scandalously
libellous. The libel law of this country is not very
practically useful, but there are cases such as this where
I would think even a disagreement would be impossible.

I am going to try to run down to see Ted., leaving tomorrow night and getting back about next Sunday or Monday. He has been at Arvida lately. One can easily conjecture the kind of work he has been doing there.

The state of mind you are in is just the state of mind Ted. has been in for some years. Notwithstending any experience I may have had, I would very much like to see both of you go into public life.
