Ottawa April 28th, 1909.

Sir,-

Herering to letter to you of the 27th ultimo I have to request you to be good enough to ascertain and report to the Department for what sum the Caughnawaga Indians would be willing to surrender St. Nicholas Island.

Quebec Government sold to the Island to Mr. Bonhoune who in good faith has epent a considerable sam of money on the Island. The survender of the Island for a fair sum would appear to be the best way to arrange the matter. It is also to be noted that very little use has been made by the Band of the Island; in fact, the band has apparently derived no benefit from the Island, and the rental the Indian claimant would derive its very small and should be easily adjusted from the Island sold. It is hoped that the Indians will see this in the proper light and meet the dase in a reasonable manner.
