A march-out of the brigade took place at 9 a. m. to the armories, and it was indeed a grand sight to see the several regiments, looking spry and smart, marching down the city streets with bands playing enlivening music all the while. The line of parade was crowded with people. Lieut.-Colonel Stinson was in command of the 10th Grenadiers, Lieut.-Colonel Rankin, of the 24th regiment, Lieut.-Colonel McLachlin, of the 25th regiment. Capt. Jones was in command of the Collegiate Institute cadets.—London, Free Press.
