Scotia Freestone, in 1847. Within it will be found the Chambers of the Legislature, the Legislative Library, and many of the Government Offices. The walls of the House of Assembly are adorned with portraits of the speakers and some of the prominent politicians. The Library is well stocked with valuable books, and in the corridor are artistically arranged a superior collection of native birds. From the top of the building a magnificent view of the rivers and surrounding country may be obtained.

THE POST OFFICE

Building is situated on Queen Square. The building is a three-story brick structure, faced with mastic, and is a credit to the city. The internal arrangements are good and modern. In another place the reader will find a table giving the time of closing and receiving the mails to and from the principal points.

THE SAVING'S BANK

is to be found in the Post Office Building, on Queen Square. Open daily, (Saturdays excepted,) from 10 a. m. to 4 p. m.

THE BANK OF P. E. ISLAND.

This edifice was built, by the Stockholders, in 1867, and is of Brick. Capital \$120,000. It was incorporated in 1856. Judge Hensley. President; J. R. Brecken, Cashier.

THE UNION BANK.

The building owned and occupied by this institution, is on the corner of Great George and Richmond Streets. It is built of Brick, and is three stories high. Capital \$146,000. Chas. Palmer, President; George McLeod, Cashier.

THE MERCHANTS BANK

occupies part of the three-story brick building, located on Water Street, between Great George and Queen Streets. It was incorporated in 1871. Capital 150,000. Robert Longworth, President; William McLean, Cashier.

THE MERCHANTS BANK OF HALIFAX

has a branch in Charlottetown, under the management of Owen Connolly. It occupies part of the Brick Building on Dorchester Street, a few doors from Queen Street, which is owned by the agent.

THE NEW LAW COURTS

is situated on Queen Square. It is a fine two-story Brick structure. A few of the local public offices are situated in this
