### TESTED RECIPES

Some Culinary Lore Recommended by Canadian Housewives. Beef Sausages.—Free half a pound beef set from skin, and shred finely. Pass a pound of lean beef through a mincing machine several times. Mix with the rest, season to taste with salt and pepper, and pound in a mortar. Press into skins. Ground Rice Cake.—Beat a quarter of a pound of butter to a cream. Stir in half a pound of castor sugar, three well-beaten eggs, a handful of washed and dried currants, a little well-chopped ground rice, mixed with four ounces of flour. Mix thoroughly, pour into a paper-lined tin, and bake without loss of time in a good oven. Raisin Sauce.—Bone half a dozen anchovies, pound them in a mortar, together with six small cloves of garlic, or three whole shallots, three bruised cloves, and a saltspoonful of cayenne pepper. Put half a pint each of mushroom catsup, walnut pickle, and soy into a saucepan, add the pounded mixture, and simmer for ten minutes. Strain, bottle and store in a cool, dry place. Savory Potatoes.—Peel and slice sufficient potatoes to make a pint. Place them in a well-buttered pie-dish. Beat up an egg in half a pint of milk, add pepper, salt, teaspoonful of chopped parsley, pour over the potatoes, cover, and bake for twenty minutes. Remove the cover and return to the oven to brown. Swiss Roll.—Butter a shallow baking tin and stand it in a warm place. Put two tablespoonfuls of raspberry jam into a cup and place on the top of the given so that it can become thoroughly warm. Break two large eggs into a basin, add four ounces of sifted castor sugar, place the basin in a bowl of hot water, and whisk with an egg beater for ten minutes. Remove the basin from the water, and whisk for a further ten minutes. Have ready three ounces of flour mixed with half a teaspoonful of baking powder. Fold it into the batter very lightly, favor with a few drops of vanilla, pour into the prepared tin, and bake for about eight minutes in a hot oven. In the meantime sprinkle a sheet of white paper with castor sugar. Turn the cake over on to the sugar, cut round the edges with a sharp knife, spread with the hot jam and roll up immediately. If any time be lost from the moment of removing the cake from the oven to the rolling of it up it will crack. Healthograms. Cataract of the eye is due to change in the lens so that it becomes opaque. Headaches in the back of the head are often due to eye strain. If these continue after the eyes are examined and the sight remedied by proper glasses a physician's individual, careful study should be given to the matter to discover the causes and possible cure. Skimmed milk contains practically no fat because of the removal of cream. The other important constituents of milk remain about the same. It is suitable for people who suffer from fat indigestion. It is a good tissue-builder and energy-producer. It is not much of a heat-maker. Abscessing of tonsils is called tonsillitis. Such abscesses usually break into the throat. When a person has had three attacks of quinsy it is usually proof enough that the tonsils are of little further service. A physician's advice on removing them should be followed. ### SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS

ANY PERSON who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Land Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader. "Dirties"—six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within one mile of his homestead within a term of at least 30 acres, solely owned and occupied by him or his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister. "Dirties"—six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead rights and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchased homestead certain districts. Price \$100 per acre.
