IN CHURCHES SUNDAY

Many Inspiring Services Held Throughout the City Yesterday—Helpful Sermons, Good Singing

AT GRACE CHURCH.
The services at Grace church yesterday were of an inspiring nature. In the morning Rev. J. C. Potts occupied the pulpit. A solo by Mr. Way was greatly appreciated. In the evening the pulpit was occupied by Rev. C. C. Purton of St. James' Church, Paris, who preached an eloquent and convincing sermon from the text, "Follow Me," taken from Matt. 4: 19, dealing with the decision of Andrew to follow Jesus. The speaker stated that "nearly all, even those of other denominations were acquainted with the fact that Nov. 30 was celebrated by the Church of England as St. Andrew's Day. We knew very little about Andrew; in fact, we could hardly know less: Andrew was a layman, so was Jesus, and all the disciples were of the laity. The church owed a great deal to the laymen, who were the organizers of most of the great movements within the church. Mr. Purton said that the moral and social conditions of our towns and cities were steadily becoming better, and pleaded for the still greater cooperation of the laity in the work of needed reforms. During the offertory the choir sang the anthem, "Awake, Thou That Sleepest," the soloists being Mrs. Cameron, Miss White and Messrs. Riley and Grimstead.

SYDENHAM ST. METHODIST.
Mr. A. Perry Park and Mr. Woods, secretary of the High School boys organization, both of Toronto, spoke in Sydenham Street Methodist church Sunday morning. Mr. Park's address contained much valuable information in dealing with boy life and was much appreciated. Spoketo a Large Audience in Victoria Hall Yesterday.

A larger audience than usual heard Pastor Perrin in his lecture "What will become of those too good for hell?" not good enough for heaven?" the speaker taking his text from 1 Tim. 2: 3-6, "Who will have all men to be saved and come unto a knowledge of the truth. For there is one God and one mediator between God and men the man Christ Jesus; who gave himself a ransom for all to be testified in due time." An incident in the life of the speaker, served to bring the exact point of the discourse before the minds of the audience. Travelling on a road near a large waterfall, he noticed a crowd hastening to the river, and soon discovered that a man with a bath upon his lips had fallen and was drowned. The question arose, what was his future destiny? Upon enquiry he found that the man was possessed of many excellent traits of character, yet not being able to measure up to God's standard "that without holiness no man can see the Lord." He surely was not good enough for heaven. Some, however, taught that between the time when he blasphemed God and was overcome by the waters, he may have been repentant and at the moment of death passed into the presence of Jehovah. This, however, was not the teaching of the Bible. The Apostle Paul showed clearly that it was a life task, a difficult matter to cultivate the spirit of the Master and bring forth the fruits of the Christ life, and that even after that there was great danger of falling away.

Mr. Hunter and Mr. Monte were the soloists and they were both very much appreciated. Then the orchestra under the leadership of Mr. Timba, rendered some fine music. This orchestra is becoming one of the chief features of the meetings and it adds a most pleasing finishing touch to them.

The item of the afternoon was the address by the Rev. J. Heyworth of Paris on "Old Born Drunk." Mr. Heyworth is an active P.S.A. worker and is very interested in the growth of the organization here. The story he told was that of a redeemed life; how a man who had been born and bred among the worst environments, and had sunk down, one would almost have thought, beyond hope of salvation, was at last rescued and his soul brought back to life. Mr. Heyworth spoke in his usual forcible manner, and the address was very much enjoyed by everyone. Throughout the meeting possessed all its usual brightness and brotherliness, and all present were amply repaid for their attendance.
