The regular meeting of the Kentville Town Council was held on Wednesday evening, Mayor, Councillors, Recorder and Clerk all present.

The Clerk read report of assessment court appeal which was received and adopted.

A petition was read from residents of Leppert Avenue asking to have legislation passed to allow the town to take over said street. On motion of Councillor Cogswell it was resolved that question be referred to street committee and that they report at a special meeting March 13th.

On motion Policeman R. Davis was appointed Sanitary Inspector. Resolved that Councillors Eaton and McDougall be a committee to prepare jury list.

Councillor Yould stated that a correspondent to the Advertiser had asked for the conditions on which the Scott Act inspector was appointed, the report of Council minutes stating the conditions were the same as last year. The clerk for the information of all, stated the conditions were, that the inspector should engage his own lawyer and the Clerk was to furnish him with the funds necessary for witness fees.

A letter was read from the manager of the D. A. R., in reference to legislation for a bonus for building new depot and offices in town. The matter was left over for special meeting.

The question of a new water cart was introduced by Councillor McDougall and after discussion was left with the Street committee. Council then adjourned.
