I.O.O.F. GRAND LODGE MEETS

Session Sitting Here To-day—
Lodge of Rebekahs Insti-
tuted in Capital.

The Grand Lodge I.O.O.F. of Sas-
katchewan is in session here today,
delegates being present from all the
lodges in the province.
Yesterday a lodge of the Rebekahs
or lady members, was instituted.
The institution took place in the af-
ternoon with twenty-three members.
In the evening over a hundred candi-
dates took the degree. The work was
put on by a degree team of ladies
from Winnipeg under the guidance of
Grand Master Rankin. This is the
third Rebekah lodge in the province,
the other two being at Mooseomin
and Davidson.
There are 40 lodges of the I.O.O.F.
in the province, ten having been in-
stituted last year.
The work of the Grand Lodge will
likely conclude tomorrow.

SCOTT WOULD EXCLUDE PRESS

Government Think that Opposi-
tion Press Misrepresents
Them—Hints at Drastic
Measures.

The aggregation known as the min-
isters of the crown in this province
are not content with attempting to
hold back information and papers
asked for by the opposition but
would be only too pleased if they
dared to keep any but their own
newspaper friends from being present
at the sessions of the assembly.
The little premier on Monday tried
to work off a scare on the newspaper
men on Monday by stating that dras-
tic measures would have to be taken
if misrepresentation of the actions of
the government members did not
cease.
Of course the opposition press is
the only ones that misrepresent him
and the government organs do nothing
but tell the truth. The fact of the
matter is, that the government
gets so befuddled over some matters
that they don't know where they are
at and they imagine that the oppo-
sition papers like the government or-
gans, should paint them as giant
saints when they are but pigmies in
the seats of the mighty.

TEACHER TO GREAT BRITAIN

Canadian Teachers Have an
Opportunity of Visiting the
Old Country.

In order that Canadian teachers
may have an opportunity of study-
ing the school systems and methods
of teaching in England, Scotland and
Wales, Mr. Alfred Mosley, C.M.G., of
London, Eng., has arranged with the
Canadian steamship companies to
take 300 Canadian teachers to Eng-
land and back for \$25. Expenses at
this rate are available from St. Law-
rence river and Atlantic embarka-
tion ports between September 1st,
1908 and February 1st, 1909.

Reception committees composed of
leading men and women in England
have been formed and visiting teach-
ers will be cordially welcomed where-
ever they may go. Every effort will
be made to give the necessary advice
and information to teachers on their
arrival. At Liverpool definite sched-
ules for the trip will be planned and
public schools, secondary schools,
technical and art schools and the
universities will be open to the vis-
itors.

Each province in the Dominion may
send in proportion to the number of
teachers in the province and selection
is to rest with the several de-
partments of education, through
which applications must be made.
Boards of trustees in cities and
towns are asked to co-operate and in
case any member of the staff is pri-
vileged to go to send to the depart-
ment of education the names in the
order which they would like to have
the applicants sent, in order that the
committee of selection may choose
wisely in case all applicants cannot
be accommodated.

The total expense of the trip need
not exceed \$125 and it is estimated
that \$200 will make provision for
extra purchases as well as for the
necessary expenses.
Applications are to be received at
the Department of Education, Regina,
not later than June 10th.

ELECTIONS ON MONDAY

Ontario and Quebec Provin-
cial Elections to be Held
Next Monday—Some Accla-
mations.

Toronto, June 1.—Nominations in
Ontario passed off without any ac-
citement except in Welland, where
Geo. W. Sutherland (Liberal) may
try and claim the election from Evan
Fraser, the late sitting member. The
election act calls for receiving nom-
inations between 12 p.m. and 2 p.m.,
but another section provides that if
an hour elapses between nominations
they shall be closed, and if only one
is nominated he shall be declared el-
ected. Sutherland was nominated
and seconded orally, at 12:20. At
12:40, a written nomination, but not
recorded, was filed for Fraser, and
about 1:30 a formal written nomina-
tion, seconded was handed in.
Sutherland's attorney claims that
the time limit had elapsed, and will
try to secure the seat. Six Conser-
vatives were elected by acclamation,
being Hon. Col. Matheson (St. Law-
rence), W. J. Paul, (Addington), Alex.
Ferguson (Simcoe South) and J. H.
Carnegie (Victoria East), in North
Hastings, Prince Edward and Gren-
ville there are no Liberal candidates,
but there are rival Conservatives in
the field. In South Waterloo George
Pattison (Conservative) and L.A.,
is opposed by a labor man. No Con-
servative is entered in West Middle-
sex, but there are two Liberals, and
in West Simcoe, J. A. Abitt calls
himself a temperance Liberal.

Quebec Nominations

Montreal, Que., June 1.—Four
elections by acclamation were announ-
ced today in the forthcoming provin-
cial contest. They are: Montingdon,
W. H. Walker, Lib.; St. Sauveur, Dr.
Cote, Lib.; Sherbrooke, Dr. Pelletier,
Lib.; Richmond, P. S. G. G. G.

It was reported that L. P.
Pelletier had been returned unopposed
in Dorchester in the Conservative
interests, but this was denied today
by Dr. Morisset who is the Liberal
candidate there.
Several ministers of the Gouin cab-
inet will have to meet opponents in
their constituencies. Hon. C. R. De-
lin is opposed in Nicolet by S. God-
reau; Hon. A. W. Weir is opposed in
Argenteuil by J. M. McDougall; Hon.
A. Turgeon is opposed in Bellecasse
by Mr. Audet; Hon. L. A. Tachereau
is opposed in Charlevoix by P. C. P.
Asteuil. This minister was also no-
minated for Montmorency, and there
he has for opponent Mr. Cauchon.
Hon. J. C. Kaine, in Quebec, is op-
posed by Mr. W. J. Breen. Hon. Mr.
Gouin, the premier was nominated
for two constituencies, the St. James
Division of Montreal and also in the
Pontneuf county, the latter being an
old Liberal stronghold. Henri Bour-
assa, who will oppose Hon. Mr. Gouin
in St. James division was also
placed in nomination in St. Hyacin-
the. In five divisions of Montreal
and two other constituencies on the
island, there will be warm fights in
two of the city constituencies there
will be three cornered fights.
