

LI HUNG CHANG STATES HIS VIEWS OF THE PRESENT SITUATION.

foreign Influences Not Wanted-The Civi-Chinese Statesman That China Canno and Shali Not be Dismembered.

Li Hung Change the most powerful statesman in China and one of ost important men in the world tolav. has expressed his views on the ent Chinese crisis for The Ne... York Sunday Journal. One thing . he nakes clear is that the Chinese will fight hard against the partition of their country by foreigners. The re-presentative to whom Li Hung Chang gave his ideas was M. Eugene Wolff, he well-known explorer. He was passing through Canton with a well known French physician whom Li asked to examine his sick grandchild. M. Wolff found Li Hung Chang living in a small wooden house situated in one of the least fashionable quarters of Canton. At the entrance doorkeeper was sleeping behind a reen wooden screen such as we see in ordinary barrooms. A porcelain ase filled with high grass stood at each side of the mean portals. High grass keeps evil spirits away from

A courtyard paved with red bricks and about 25 feet in length by 12 broad led to the reception from.

This, too, proved to be a very ordinary apartment. Instead of paintings there were three unframed paper pictures hanging on the wall. On the mantel or what served for one was a perfume lamp between two thin candlesticks. The furniture, a round table, four chairs, three easy chairs and a small sofa, also two footstools, were old and partly covered with faded green plush. The frames were of mahogany.

The floor was covered with mat-ting, and from the ceiling hung a cage containing canary birds. In the countries of the great powers, and the small powers, too, the social question is the nucleus of the most far-reaching troubles that comfort the governing classes. In all the European empires the social question predominates. I ask you, can you honestly advise us to burden ourselves with such an octopus

simply because it is the fashion?
"You complain that we are aderse to foreign influences, but forget that at the very beginning of intercourse with civilization 20,-000 Chinese settlers were murdered on the island of Luzon in one week. Spaniards did that, and I assure you this massacre encouraged us in no way to open our doors to you 'civilizers.' Why should you regard us as 'savages' anyhow? You throw up to us the murder of white men within our borders. Is murder unknown in Europe and America? You speak of the persecution of Christians. Well, let us assume that a course of hundred of our Buddhists to your country to convert your people and to preach, for instance, that unless they want to be eternally damned they must refuse to submit to compulsery army service merely because the new religion they

imposed upon them says so. "Your missionaries ask our people every day in the year to break the laws of this country and to refrain from obeying the laws. As to the persecution of Christians, our Government has never engaged in any nor encouraged any. Christians have been killed just as Chinese are killed in San Francisco, New York, in the Dutch West Indies and where not? We employ no missionaries, no pro-selyte makers of anywkind. We are not proud, but we are too smart to prescribe to anybody the fashion in which he should pray to God. We never asked a living being to wor-ship as we do. One of the most pernicious and dangerous of your idiosyncrasies is to ask and force people to subscribe to a certain mode of worship. We never do that.

There is only one redeeming thing about the envy with which the powers regard each other saves us from being victimized to a greater extent, for you hate each other more than we

"You criticize our sullen attitude Do you expect us to make love because you robbed us? we know your programme well en ough. The north for Russia, a goo part of the south-and central China for England, the rest for France and Germany-so, it has been planned. We are to retain nothing; everything for the fereigners, nothing for the Chinese. But one can't do away w:th 500,000,000 people by a stroke of sleight of hand. It may not be very difficult to defeat us, but to conquer us will be a hard job, I assure you. It's like eating a real Chinese meal. A courageous European or American may tackle it, but I doubt that he will digest it.

"Your envy, your rapacity in preying upon each other-we play them against you. We disgorge what we have to disgorge, even such mings that you promised by treaty never to ask us to give up. this, but at the same time we see to it that Great Britain, which is stronger than all the rest of you, forbids you to go too far. International politics are based on fearfear and the apprehension of threats. Doubtless you know a great deal, but you have no idea of the limitless energy which China, her people, her empress and all of us are capa-
