THE RACES.

Splendid 5 speed contests at the Peninsular Exhibition.

The races yesterday were splendid. The track was in good condition and the contests were all sharp and keen. In the 230 foot every heat was a game contest between Duffy and Erie Maid for first place, the rest of the field being well bunched for place.

The 224 pace also afforded thrilling amusement for the lovers of good horse races. In the second heat College Queen won from Little Tim in a drive. It was the prettiest contest of speed imaginable. Both horses swung into the stretch with Little Tim leading. Almost at the wire, however, College caught up and crossed first by a bare neck. In the third heat, Little Tim and College Queen came together about 150 yards from the start, and both owners, John Glassford, and D. McLachlan, were thrown and their skulls smashed, but fortunately neither man nor horse were hurt.

Both drivers claimed the other to blame, but the judges, after some time decided that College Queen should be given third place.

In the last heat Golden Tex fell down just as he crossed the wire, but escaped injury.

REGISTRATION BOARD.

Proceedings at the Preliminary Session of this Body.

The registration board met for organization at 4 o'clock yesterday. There were present, Judge Bell, Judge Woods, Judge Houston and County Clerk James Holmes.

It was moved by Judge Woods, seconded by Judge Houston, that Judge Bell be chairman. Carried.

On motion James Holmes was appointed secretary.

On motion of Judge Woods, seconded by Judge Bell, it was decided to have three registration divisions, as follows:

No. 1 Division—That part of the city known as North Chatham.

No. 2 Division—All that part of the city west of Sixth street, Centre street and Queen street.

No. 3 Division—Balance of city. It was moved by M. Houston, seconded by Judge Woods, that No. 1 Division be held at the police station; No. 2 Division be held in Harrison Hall; and No. 3 Division be held in the town hall.

It was moved by Judge Bell, seconded by Judge Woods, that Mr. Houston attend at police station, Judge Woods at Town Hall, and Judge Bell at Harrison Hall. Judge Bell and Judge Woods voted for the motion and the former declared it carried.

On motion of Judge Houston, seconded by Judge Woods, it was decided that the Board should meet for registration purposes on Monday the 15th, Wednesday 17th, and Saturday 20th. It was moved by Judge Houston, seconded by Judge Woods, that the court of appeal be composed of Judge Bell, Judge Woods and Judge Houston, and that the court of appeal be held at 10 o'clock, a. m., Thursday, Oct. 25, Carried.

Moved by Judge Houston, seconded by Judge Woods, that supplementary sittings be held on Saturday Oct. 27th. Carried.

On motion of Judge Houston, seconded by Judge Woods, W. E. Hamilton was appointed secretary of the court of appeal.

KENT BATTALION.

Lieut.-Col. Holmes Visits the Maple City to Reorganize the Regiment.

Major Rankin, of this City, Stated as Commanding Officer—Other Prospective Appointments

Kent is to have her battalion! The energetic efforts of Major J. B. Rankin and other promoters of the project have been successful and the work of organization will forthwith commence. It is the desire of the Militia Department to commence with at least four companies, which can be gradually augmented as the battalion gains strength.

Lieut.-Col. Holmes, commanding officer of the militia in this district, arrived in the Maple City at one o'clock this afternoon, for the purpose of interviewing the prospective officers and making the preliminary arrangements for organization. He was met by Major Rankin and other officers, and adjourned to the Hotel Garner.

Interviewed by THE PLANET, Lieut.-Col. Holmes said that he was delighted with the proposed reorganization of the 24th Battalion, and believed that there were splendid prospects ahead for it. He was here to meet the prospective officers, talk over the formation, inspect the drill hall, and look into matters of equipment. Kent County should contribute one of our finest battalions," was Col. Holmes' comment.

Major Rankin has received considerable important correspondence, which will be submitted to Col. Holmes this afternoon.

Arthur W. Dickie writes from near Dresden that there is much enthusiasm there over the formation of a company. Dickie has seen eleven years' service in the 38th Regiment, and served on Niagara frontier during the Fenian raid. He is a graduate from the military school in '74, with 2nd class honors.

There are good prospects in Ridgetown, writes Herbert D. Smith, and a first class opportunity to form a company there.

Leonard J. Jamieson, of Blenheim, was one of the first applicants to enter the regiment.

A communication from C. B. Oliver, Merlin, says: "Every member of the Tilbury East Rifle Club hails with delight the prospect of the reorganization of the 24th regiment." They have made the 21st Essex battalion already well known by their rifles, but would like to shoot in a Kent battalion. One of the company might be easily formed with headquarters at Merlin.

Geo. K. Chisholm, of Chatham, has also made formal application.

PROSPECTIVE OFFICERS.

Among the prospective officers mentioned by Lieut.-Col. Holmes were the following:

Major J. B. Rankin as Commanding Officer. Major Rankin graduated as a member of the 60th Rifles, Toronto, and served with the Queen's Own, 22nd Bruce Batt., 24th Kent Batt. and 27th Lambton Batt.

W. R. Hickey, Bothwell, as senior major. Mr. Hickey is a graduate of the London Military School and served as captain in the 24th.

D. W. B. Spry as adjutant. Mr. Spry was identified with the 35th Simcoe and 24th Elgin.

T. K. McKeand as paymaster. Mr. McKeand was a captain in the 13th Hamilton and the 24th.

Edwin Bell as captain. Mr. Bell was a lieutenant in the 24th.

J. S. Black as captain. Mr. Black has had much experience as sergeant instructor.

Frank D. Laurie and Wm. Mowbray as lieutenants. Mr. Laurie held lieutenancy commissions in the Queen's Own and 48th Highlanders, Toronto, and Mr. Mowbray is a graduate of R. M. C., Kingston, and lieutenant in the 30th Wellington Rifles.

For the positions of junior major, quartermaster and surgeon no suggestions have been made, but it is understood that there is a warm contest among the city physicians for the last named.

The prospective officers must undertake to qualify at Military College and all the staff must be mounted. A Regimental Band—and a good one—will be formed at once.
