MR. PUGSLEY BREAKS OUT.

In one of his St. John speeches the new Minister of Public Works after he found that he was not to be opposed, declared that half a million dollars was contributed to the Conservative election fund in the last campaign, and that to his knowledge \$25,000 was subscribed for the Opposition contest in a New Brunswick county which he indicates as Westmoreland. Mr. Pugsley does not say who contributed these sums. Nor does he connect Mr. Borden with the matter in any way. Yet he coolly challenges the Opposition leader to bring a libel action against him to disclose the facts. One would think that Mr. Pugsley has had his fill of libel actions this year, after the unfortunate experience of his distinguished client whom Mr. Pugsley succeeds in the Ministry, and whose return to the Cabinet is indefinitely postponed in Mr. Pugsley's favor on account of the result of that action. Mr. Pugsley knows, as everyone else does, that Mr. Borden could not proceed against him on statements that make no charge against Mr. Borden, and do not name a single individual but Mr. Pugsley himself. The Minister also knew when he spoke that Mr. Borden was west of Lake Superior on his way to British Columbia, and had dates arranged for public meetings in the west for several weeks ahead. His proclamation is, therefore, the cheapest kind of bluff.

But Parliament will meet in a few weeks. Mr. Pugsley and Mr. Borden will both be there, and so will Mr. Aylesworth, of whom Mr. Pugsley has made himself a sort of understudy. That will be the time for Mr. Pugsley to tell all he knows. If he has personal information of large contributions to the Conservative campaign fund by any corporation or individuals he will need no libel suit to make it public. Nobody will check his disclosures unless it be his own friends, and a curious public will pay very close attention to Mr. Pugsley's reminiscences. Nor will Mr. Pugsley need to volunteer his disclosures. He will not be in the House many hours before he will receive a challenge to make public all the facts which he has in his possession. Not only will he be asked to make his charges, but so far as the Opposition is concerned he will be given full opportunity to prove them. He will have the machinery of the House at his command and the majority of the House and its committees behind him. Therefore it is not necessary for the Minister to beg for a libel suit which he does not want, and which he could probably cause to be postponed indefinitely as he did the Crockett prosecution. He will be able to go right ahead and establish before Christ-mas all the facts that he can prove.

FIGHT WITH A LION.

Tamer Killed in a Theatre Dressing Room.

A man was killed by a lion after a terrible fight in a dressing room of the Gloucester Palace of Varieties. The lion was one of a troupe of seven or eight performing animals which are put through their paces nightly by "Miss Ella." The man who was killed was Joseph Hasselman, her chief assistant.

The lions recently arrived in Gloucester from South Wales, and were installed in cages in a room behind the stage. Hasselman was cleaning out the cages when one of the brutes escaped into a dressing room.

He tried to drive it back into its cage, and the animal became furious and attacked him. His screams for help attracted his mistress, who pluckily entered the room and tried to drive the lion off with her whip.

The beast, however, attached her and drove her from the room. Hasselman was by this time unconscious. A rifle was brought, but it was found that it was impossible to shoot the beast without endangering the life of the man.

Finally the theatre fire hose was brought into action, and a powerful stream of water was turned on the lion. This subdued it at once, and it was driven back into its cage.

Hasselman, who was terribly mangled, was placed in an ambulance at once and hurried to the hospital, but he died on the way.

His injuries were of a most fearful nature, for the animal literally clawed and crushed him to pieces. His cries, "Save me! Save me!" were heartrending.

"Miss Ella" is suffering greatly from shock. She states that although she has had eight years' experience with her lions she has never had an accident before of this kind. She is a native of Germany, and is traveling in company with her father and husband.

At the inquest it was stated that the lion had the character of being a particularly quiet animal. One witness said the lion did not growl, but stood digging its claws into the man's shoulders, as though waiting to play. The lion had its mouth over Hasselman's head, but did not attempt to bite him. The jury found that Hasselman died as the result of injuries inflicted by the lion, and attributed no blame to anyone.
