FIGHTING TUBERCULOSIS.

How Hospitals Carry the War Into the Tenements

If made ten years ago the statement that tuberculosis, the scourge of the tenements, can be cured right in the surroundings where it is found at its worst would have been declared preposterous. As a matter of fact, though, since the announcement several years ago that uncomplicated pulmonary tuberculosis could be arrested by dispensary treatment forty-five actual cures have been effected at the New York Postgraduate Medical school and pospital alone, and thereby the poor have been visited by a new blessing. Fifty men and women are at present being treated at the dispensary rooms of the Postgraduate hospital, going early in the morning before work and again in the evening after the day's labors are over. These fifty represent

every stage of the "great white plague," from the newcomer who is hoping almost against hope to the advanced patient whose lungs have already been found by the investigating committee to be "free from all signs of the disease." The patients must necessarily make a long and hard fight. They are frankly informed in the beginning as to the true state of their health, and then they are told that the success of the treatment depends in a large measure upon their fidelity to the directions given them. If they do not follow these directions they are dismissed. The doctors at the Postgraduate hospital have successfully worked on

the theory that pulmonary tubercu-losis is one of the many results of malnutrition. Consequently they aim to build up the body faster than the disease can tear it down and by restoring the bleed to its normal state deprive the germs of the disease of their chance to thrive. Two doses of emulsion of fats are administered to the patients every day at the dispen-sary, and the patients are required to consume at home large quantities of milk and eggs. The hospital authorities, believing that charity tends to pauperize, admit only those patients who can afford to pay for the food they must consume at home, but nothing is charged for the treatment at

History In Dolls. There are many theories for the teaching of history, but a nation's his-tory displayed through successive periods by dolls is a novel idea that has just been realized in Paris by M. Leo Claretie, who, besides being an emi-nent educationist, is an ardent advo-cate of rendering education attractive: His system of the history of France in dressed dolls is to be placed on public exhibition as an object lesson in its capabilities. Even the prehistoric periods, whose life can only be known on the testimony of the rocks, are represented. Within the pale of history every page is represented by its lead ing figures, as Gaul, pre-Roman, Roman and Frankish. Then come the crusades, the English wars, the later middle ages, the early modern period and so on to the third republic .- Lon-

Acetylene Gas.
Acetylene gas is now used as an explosive. By means of an air mixture a force is obtained from it which can compete with that of powder and dynamite. Carbide of calcium is reduced to small particles and put into a tin box. In this the carbide lies at the bottom and above it is a partition filled with water. After the drill hole has been completed the cartridge is a wooden stopper. Then the partition is perforated by a blow from a pin and the water comes in contact with the carbide, whereby acetylene gas is generated. This mixes with the air of the drill hole. After five minutes the gas is ignited by an electric spark.
