LOCAL LABOR BARRED

St. John Shipowners Import Men to Break the Strike.

Shipowners Are Obstinate and Will Not Agree to Submit Longshoremen's Case to Arbitration—Trouble May Yet End in a Federation of Owners, Such as Obtained in Montreal, and New Order of Unloading.

St. John, N. B., Nov. 23.—The strike at this port between the shipping firms and the longshoremen is serious. It is difficult to tell what the outcome will be. The shipping men in the combine declare they'll have no more to do with local labor, and are using every effort to get men here from Montreal to handle all their freight. Thirty-seven Italians reached here yesterday morning from Montreal, and were taken at once to Sand Point. At first some refused to go aboard the Parisian, fearing they were to be taken back to Europe, but by 5 o'clock most of them were at work. A large detachment of police were on hand to prevent trouble, but only a few local longshoremen showed up, and they looked illly on. Barricades had also been built to keep the crowds back. Three more carloads of men will arrive to-day from Montreal to work on two or three ships about five.

Tuesday Hugh Allan, with representatives of other lines, met officials and longshoremen, but refused to grant the latter's request to have the matter submitted to arbitration. Local workmen also offered to work for the wage being paid at Portland, or on guarantee of \$10 a week, but Hugh Allan refused to discuss the matter any further. He would pay the old rate of nothing, preferring to withdraw ships from this port rather than give in.

The idea of the three companies—the C. P. R., Allan and Donaldson—to work out a federation such as exists in Montreal, in all about 250 men will be brought here. The men will work in shifts of no regular hours, but as long as there is work to be done. On whatever boat or boats of the companies may be in port, all expenses will be posted, and men will be fed and housed on the ships.

As far as the Allan Line people are concerned, they say that it would be better to take men to Halifax on one steamer and bring them back on the next. However, the federation deal, the steamship people say, will go through. The Allan Line people have deposited \$375 with city officials for fifty licenses.

Work is now going on on the Donaldson liner Natalis and Furness line Florence under the summer agreement, which does not expire until the end of the month. The companies will refuse to pay the increased rate.

LONG STRIKE SETTLED.

Kingston Locomotive Works Makes Peace With Machinists.

Kingston, Nov. 23.—A. H. Champion, Toronto, second vice-president of the International Association of Machinists, visited Kingston, and had a conference with Mr. Birmingham, managing-director of the Canadian Locomotive Works, and as a result the Kingston strike is called off. The firm agrees to apply its policy of absolute non-discrimination to the members of the International Association of Machinists as well as to all others. The strike has been on since April, 1902.

The company intimates that no man whose conduct and services are satisfactory will be dismissed to make room for others. This means that those taking the place of the strikers will not be removed.

Pummelled by Strikers.

Stratford, Nov. 23.—On Saturday, Nov. 11, Stanley Teiford, a machinist, was set upon and badly handled by some of the striking machinists. Two of them, Robert Moorehead and Christopher Wilson, the former of whom was doing badly harm, and the latter of common assault. Sentence was deferred.

Drops Dead on the Street.

Brantford, Nov. 23.—John R. Stephens, a printer, dropped dead on Market street last evening from heart failure. Stephens was well known throughout Ontario, having worked in many offices. He came to Brantford only last Saturday on account of the death of his father. He was married and about 57 years of age.

Castro's Courage Ebbs.

Washington, Nov. 23.—With the French warships all Marlinique, a day's cruise from Venezuelan waters, President Castro has begun to show signs of a possible intention to modify his attitude toward the French Government.

British Diplomats Decorated.

London, Nov. 23.—The Hon. Allan Johnstone, the British Minister to Denmark, and Arthur James Herbert, the British Minister to Norway, have been promoted to the rank of Knight Commander of the Victorian Order.

Girl Burns to Death.

Montreal, Nov. 23.—Lillie White, 7 years old, residing with her parents at 316 Magdalen street, poured coal oil on herself yesterday, and her clothes catching fire, the child burned to death.

STRONG ADVICE FROM FARMERS

Busy Session of the Tariff Commission at the City Council Chambers

Commissioners at Wallaceburg This Afternoon—The Sugar Growing Industry

Two sessions of the Canadian tariff commission in Chatham and Wallaceburg to-day gave opportunity to farmers and manufacturers alike to give testimony about the present tariff rates as the latter appealed to their particular cases. The commission is composed of Hon. W. F. Fielding, minister of finance; Hon. William Patterson, minister of customs, and Hon. L. P. Brodeur, minister of inland revenue, and all three members took an active part in asking questions of the witnesses who appeared at the two sessions. The sessions were held in the council chambers, Harrison Hall, and the Wallaceburg Board of Trade had charge of arrangements there.

Kent county is interested in numerous branches of industry and most of them had ardent representatives to give testimony before the commission, and it was nearly one o'clock when the Maple City session closed, the commission leaving for Wallaceburg on the Pere Marquette special at 1:30.

Charles Stephens, of Dresden, representing the West Lambton Farmers' Association, made an eloquent address on behalf of the agriculturalists, asking for greater justice to the freer trade and less restricted duties. "We farmers have been watching the meetings of the Tariff Commission," he declared, "and we are sick of so much selfishness. But I see your intelligence don't believe it. If governments are not to look after the interests of the people, what is the name of God, are they for? Just to pension off themselves with the people's money? We hope not, and look for strong action from you gentlemen."

C. G. Hall, representing the Farmers' Association, asked greater reduction of duty on manufactured articles.

Thomas Barnes spoke along the same lines, earnestly on behalf of the farmers of Southern Kent and appealed for greater consideration to the agriculturalist.

Hon. Mr. Patterson asked Mr. Barnes whom he represented.

Mr. Barnes said 500 organized farmers.

Hon. Mr. Patterson asked if farmers did not want greater protection. Mr. Barnes said farmers did not ask for increased duty. They asked for no favors but did not desire the manufacturers to have special protective privileges.

Hon. Mr. Fielding—Yet it is a remarkable thing that the highest protection requests we have received are from farmers. We have heard requests for 40 per cent. duty from manufacturers, but the other day we had farmers asking for 300 per cent. duty. What do you think of that?

Mr. Barnes—All I can say is that they must have been farmers run wild. I believe the meanest men and the best men are found among the farmers. I am impressed with the idea that you are getting the mean kind before you.

Hon. Mr. Brodeur asked concerning the duty on tobacco.

Mr. Barnes thought all should share alike.

David Wilson, secretary of Farmers' Association, spoke along the same lines.

County Commissioner Joseph Horn asked for tariff for revenue only.

James Innes, representing the manufacturers of cooperage stock, presented a petition asking that a duty of 10 per cent. be placed on staves.

N. H. Stevens, for the Canada Flour Mills Co., appeared in the interest of the corn meal mills and asked an increase of duty on corn meal.

Hon. Mr. Fielding said the matter was one of freight rates and he believed should be handled by the railroad commission.

Caleb Wheeler desired to deal with the export of fresh fish, upon which he recommended a prohibitive duty, except on carp.

Ald. Marshall for the Defiance Iron Works asked for an increase of duty on gasoline engines.

FIRE PROTECTION

WAS KICKED BY HORSE

Seth Crowell of Croton Receives Serious Injuries as Result of Accident

Went to Stable to Attend to his Horse When Animal Kicked Him and Tramped Upon Him

A very serious accident occurred in Dover Township this morning, as a result of which Seth Crowell, of Croton, had a very narrow escape from death. He now lies in the Public General Hospital in a critical condition.

Mr. and Mrs. Crowell were guests at the residence of Mr. and Mrs. Glover, Baldon street, about six miles from the city. They went to Dover to attend the wedding of David Clark, of Bear Creek, to Miss Burke, of Dover, which was performed at the home of the bride last evening.

This morning Mr. Crowell went out to the stable with Mr. Glover to attend to his horses. When he entered the stable the horse kicked him in the head, knocked him down and tramped upon him. The unfortunate man received some internal injuries and a severe wound in his head. He would probably have been killed but for Mr. Glover, who was in another part of the stable and went to the rescue.

The horse is not a vicious one, but was in a strange stable, which no doubt accounts for the accident. An electric car had passed the house and Mr. Crowell was removed to the Public General Hospital, where his injuries were attended to by a local surgeon.

NEW JANITOR

Albert Cable Was Appointed to Take Anthony Edwards' Position in Central School

The Central School managers met in the school last evening for the purpose of appointing a janitor to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Anthony Edwards. Several applications were received, and the appointment was given to Albert Cable, his duties to commence on the first day of December. His salary will be \$30 per month.

Other small matters, such as the plumbing connections with the Chatham Heating Company's pipes, and the matter of purchasing checks and stops for the doors in the school were dealt with.

There were present at the meeting Chairman Paxton and Trustees Benson, Robertson and Lenfestey.

DESERTERS

Two Soldiers One From London and the Other From Toronto Arrested in Chatham This Morning

Yesterday afternoon the police authorities received a telegram from the military headquarters at London warning them to be on the look-out for a couple of deserters. Tom Groves and James Dodson were put on the case and they located their men this morning about one o'clock at the C. P. R. station.

The deserters' names are Robert Walde, of London, and James Phillips, of the Engineers, Toronto. They were making their way to Detroit and were found sleeping in a box car. Walde is a Scotchman about three months out from the Old Country. Phillips' home is in South Africa. He served all through the South African war. They both take their arrest very coolly and joke about it this morning in the Police Court.

Phillips wrote to Walde that he would join him in London. Before they left London on their way to Detroit they got drunk and they were not sober when they arrived in Chatham. They were easily detected as they had their military coats with them.

The men will be taken back to London to-day. The smallest penalty they can be given is 14 days in the guard house. They claimed they were going west where they had received positions on a ranch.

FINE ADDRESS

SMITH IN WENTWORTH

Liberals Claim an Error, But Conservatives Celebrate.

Aylesworth Gets a Majority of 500 in North York—Visited Patronage Factories on the Eve of Election and Got His Majorities in Aurora and Newmarket—Pardee Loses More Than Half Liberal Majority—Chisholm Drops Over 500 Liberal Majority in Antigonish, N. S.

Hamilton, Nov. 23.—The complete returns for Wentworth give E. D. Smith, Conservative, a majority of eight over W. O. Sealey. Even the Liberals admit that the figures that they have obtained give Smith that majority, but they claim there is a mix-up in one of the Glanford divisions. The Conservatives think that a recount will increase their candidate's majority. Smith had majorities in seven out of ten municipalities.

Smith's majorities were as follows: Balfleet, 241; Dundas, 153; Barton, 55; Glanford, 11; Binkook, 25; East Flamborough, 42. Total, 549.

Sealey's majorities were: Ancaster, 271; Beverly, 210; West Flamborough, 60. Total, 541.

The above figures show that Binkook, Barton and Glanford changed Liberal majorities into Conservative majorities.

The Conservatives held a celebration in honor of their victory at Dundas. There was a procession and a mass meeting in the Drill Hall where Mr. Smith delivered an address.

Aylesworth in North York. Newmarket, Nov. 23.—Hon. A. B. Aylesworth, Postmaster-General, was elected in North York yesterday by a majority of 500 over Archie McCaul. The victory was won after a strenuous fight, which ended with a stunning Liberal majority of 492 votes as compared with the election of Sir William Mulock two years ago. During the last few days of the campaign Mr. Aylesworth visited the various factories in these two places, and it is said that the men were advised that if Aylesworth did not win the future of the industries might not be very good.

When he came up to Newmarket after the polls closed, the members of the local association gave him a rousing reception. There was a torchlight procession, led by the 48th Highlanders' Band of Toronto, and a public meeting at the Town Hall, where the mail bags were manufactured and where other Government patronage is distributed.

Pardee in West Lambton. Sarnia, Nov. 23.—The election to fill the vacant seat in the Commons resulted in West Lambton electing F. F. Pardee, in opposition to R. E. Lonsieur, the Conservative candidate. The Conservatives of West Lambton have every reason to feel gratified at the result of the polling. Before 8 o'clock Pardee's election was conceded. So far as heard from, Mr. Pardee's majority is given at 350, with about 25 polling subdivisions to hear from. Judging these on the same basis as the vote given in the election in 1904, these places will reduce Pardee's majority to about the 200 mark. In the last election in 1904 the Liberal majority was 447.

Chisholm in Antigonish. Halifax, N. S., Nov. 23.—The bye-election yesterday in Antigonish resulted in the election of Wm. Chisholm, Liberal, by about 250 majority over E. L. Jerrior, Conservative. The chief issue of the campaign was the salary grab, which was opposed strenuously by a Conservative candidate. The Liberals had the county full of stump speakers throughout the campaign, while Jerrior fought single-handed and succeeded in reducing the Liberal majority for Melness in November, 1904, of 505, to 250 yesterday.

Liberal Loses in a Year. The returns are not yet complete but enough is known to enable a comparison to be made with the results of a year ago. At the general elections all four constituencies returned the Liberal candidates, and with the exception of Wentworth, all gave large majorities. These majorities have been greatly reduced.
