## PROVINCIAL LEGISLATURE

### Fredericton Bills Introduced—Foot Bridge Over St. John River at Clair, Madawaska.

In the Legislature Thursday after-  
noon Mr. Allen introduced a bill to  
authorize the city of Fredericton to  
issue debentures to the amount of  
\$20,000 to pay off the floating debt.  
These debentures are to be paid \$1,000  
each year; also a bill relating to rates  
and taxes in the city of Fredericton.  
This bill authorizes the City Council  
to appoint a commission to prepare an  
assessment law, and to pay ex-City  
Clerk Beck with an annuity of \$400.

Hon. Mr. Tweedie introduced a bill  
to exempt certain property in Chatham  
from taxation. On the ground  
of urgency this bill was read a second  
time.

Mr. Clair introduced a bill to author-  
ize Joseph R. Long to build a foot  
bridge over the river St. John at Clair.  
Mr. Burden introduced a bill to in-  
corporate the McAdam Masonic Hall Co.

Hon. Mr. LaBillois introduced a bill  
to amend the Highway Act. He ex-  
plained that it was intended to impose  
a fine on road masters who refused to  
do their duty. It was also intended to  
legalize what is the custom in meeting  
teams. Also defined what is a rate-  
payer. Persons from 18 to 65 will be  
called out to open winter roads. It  
exempts clergymen from this duty.

The House went into committee on  
the bill in amendment to the Towns  
Incorporation Act, Mr. Allen in the  
chair.  
Hon. Mr. Pugsley explained that  
this bill was to provide that when a  
town was incorporated at its first elec-  
tion any person should be eligible to  
be elected Mayor or Alderman who  
was liable to be rated for the necessary  
amount. The matter had come in con-  
sequence of conditions existing in the  
town of Edmundston which had just  
been incorporated and where the as-  
sessment for the county had made no  
assessment because they thought that

their duties had ceased when Edmund-  
ston was proclaimed a town.

Mr. Hazen said that this was merely  
personal legislation to please some in-  
dividual who wanted to be Mayor of  
Edmundston.

Hon. Mr. Tweedie said that under  
the terms of the existing Act the men  
who voted for the Mayor and Alder-  
men at the first town election were  
only liable to be rated because there  
had been no town assessment and the  
qualification of Mayor and Aldermen  
should stand on the same footing.

The bill was agreed to.

Mr. Burns introduced a bill respect-  
ing the Gulf Shore Railway Company.

### The Central Railway.

Hon. Mr. Pugsley in reply to Mr.  
Hazen said—I have been endeavoring  
to obtain the information for my Hon-  
orable friend, but some portions of it  
can only be obtained by correspond-  
ence. Although the stock stands on  
the Company's book in the name of  
Mr. Skinner, some of the certificates  
are held outside the province and  
may have changed hands by de-  
livery of the certificates. Therefore,  
I am not at present able to give the  
names of these persons who hold cer-  
tificates. The stock in the Central Rail-  
way Co., consisting of about 8280  
shares of the par value of \$25,000 in  
the Central Railway, was held by Dr.  
DeBertram, Clark & Co. and Drexel &  
Co., of Philadelphia, Bankers. This  
stock and \$540,000 of first mortgage  
bonds were acquired for the sum of  
\$154,000 cash.

The House took recess and met again  
at 8 o'clock.

The bill to enable the president and  
directors of the home for aged females  
in St. John to hold property to the  
value of \$100,000 was agreed to. The  
House then adjourned.

### REGIMENT BURIED ALIVE.

Report That a Whole Regiment  
of Indian Troops

Were Buried by the Earthquake  
at Dharmasala.

No Hope of Rescue Held Out for the  
Entombed Men.

Lahore, Punjab, India, April 7.—  
Four hundred and seventy men of  
Guerkha regiments were buried alive  
as a result of the earthquake at the  
hill station of Dharmasala, 36 miles  
north west of Lahore, according to the  
last information received. The report  
adds that it is impossible to rescue the  
entombed men.

### MASONIC HALL

To be Erected at McAdam by a Joint  
Stock Company at Cost of \$5,000.

J. Wesley Hoyt, collector of cus-  
toms, Geo. J. Green, customs officer,  
Roderick McKenzie, car foreman,  
Chas. K. Howard, station agent,  
all of McAdam, and Dr. Mel-  
ville L. Young of Vanceboro are  
applying to the legislature for incor-  
poration as The McAdam Hall Com-  
pany. The object of the Company is  
to erect a hall at McAdam to be used  
by the Masonic order, as a meeting  
place for charitable and religious  
societies, and for such other purposes  
the directors above named may de-  
cide. The capital stock of the Com-  
pany is \$5,000.

### BRIDGE ACROSS ST. JOHN.

Joseph Long to Build Toll Bridge Be-  
tween Clair and Fort Kent.

Joseph R. Long of Clair, Madawaska  
County, proposes to build a foot pas-  
senger bridge across the St. John river  
between that place and Fort Kent  
in Maine. Mr. Clair now operates a  
ferry boat between these places, but  
there are times in spring and  
fall when it is impossible to run  
a ferry and the people are un-  
able to cross the river, sometimes  
for weeks at a time. He proposes to  
maintain it as a toll bridge and asks  
authority of the legislature to  
build the bridge and exact tolls.  
He already has a charter  
from the Maine legislature to  
build on the American side of the  
river. Mr. Clair of Madawaska is pro-  
moting the bill in the legislature here.
