Cotton, in calling upon the Postmaster-General for a few remarks, said: "We have found the field postoffice to such good advantage that I hope this will not be the last one to be established in military camps in Canada."

A warm demonstration greeted the Hon. Mr. Lemieux when he stepped forward to speak. Proceeding, he said: "Commanding officer, officers and men: I can assure you it affords me a very great deal of pleasure to be present on the occasion of the re-establishment of the military camp at the old and historic town of Niagara."

In inaugurating an improved post-office service in connection with the camp, I feel that I am privileged in being permitted to contribute in some slight degree towards the efficiency of the military organization of the Dominion, and of preserving and fostering the traditions surrounding our common flag.

The ceremony was concluded by Capt. Eccleston, who has charge of the post-office at the camp, raising a flag—white and red—the military postoffice colors.

Subsequently the Postmaster-General motored around the camp. Earlier in the day the Postmaster-General inspected the rural mail delivery system in the Milton and Mount Nemo divisions of the postal service.

"How do you find it?" asked a newspaper representative. "It is working admirably," replied the Postmaster-General.
