DR. KANE'S POLAR EXPEDITION.

It is well known that a new polar expedition in search of Sir John Franklin, has been endowed by George Peabody, Esq. of London, and furnished with vessels by Mr. Grinnell of New York.

Dr. Kane's reasons for believing in the existence of an open polar sea are, first, the necessity of such a supposition to account for the equalization of temperatures; second, a careful examination of the currents into and out of the Arctic Ocean, third, the proof that there are two poles of cold, or points of extreme cold, both of which are situated at 90 degrees; fourth, the fact of a milder temperature at the extreme northern point that has been reached; and fifth, and above all, the immense herds of reindeer and quadrupeds and fish that are seen travelling to the north at the utmost limits reached by man.

Dr. Kane covers each sledge with a gutta percha boat to use when he reaches the polar sea.

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AMERICAN EXPEDITION TO JAPAN.

Correspondence of the N. Y. Tribune. Bay of Yedo, Tuesday, Feb. 28, 1854. Limited as it is in time, I cannot let the opportunity slip of giving you some notice of our sailing. We are now anchored off the town of Canagawa, about fifteen miles above the former anchorage of the squadron, and about 12 miles from the City of Yedo.

It was a fine sight to see our three noble steamers—the Powhatan, the Susquehanna and the Mississippi—each with a store ship in tow, as they passed out of the harbor. Old Admiral Folger fired a salute from the *Winchester*, his flag-ship, manned the rigging and gave us three cheers, which were duly returned.

On the 7th of February we put to sea, the sailing vessels having left on the 1st. On the 11th we made land at daylight.

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etc. To our surprise they showed us very correct engravings of our guns and other things they had seen on board the ships last year.

The next day our old friend Yensham, brought the answer on board, which was to the effect that the Commissioners were ready to make a treaty, and waited only for him to sign it. We were still detained the rest of the day at Uraga, but on the 24th, in the morning, we got up anchor to join the fleet, which in the mean time had gone ten miles higher up the bay, as far as Canagawa.

The Courier, St. John, New Brunswick, gives a list of the new members returned, and the following measures on which it is said that the new House will take a stand.

1st. Registration of Voters and Vote by Ballot, the suffrage to be extended, or confined to rate payers on £20 real estate, or £100 personal.

2d. Municipal Corporations in each County. 3d. Appointment of Road Grants in gross to these Corporations.

4th. An improved system of education based on compulsory taxation for half the cost, the other to be supplied from the general revenue.

5th. The exclusion of all employees of Government from the exercise of the franchise, interference in elections, and from seats in the people's House.

6th. An elevation of the moral standard of the House, so that even a suspicion of habits of picketing and stealing may not be fairly brought against the Members, individuals or collectively.

On carefully analyzing the list of Members, we are satisfied that there will be a large majority for the above measures.

The gentlemen who have voted before for such reforms, or are known to be favorable to them, number some thirty out of forty-one, who compose the Assembly. These men are known to be all of one mind on all the big questions of policy, which they are called upon to deal.
