**THE DELEGATES' VISIT.**  
On Wednesday the delegates and party left the Grand Falls to visit New Brunswick, 18 miles distant, where an agricultural exhibition was being held. Messrs. Sheldon and Sparrow expressed themselves on the way as being very much pleased with the fertility of the soil which their route traversed. After ascending the very steep hill just before you come to New Denmark a splendid view of the grand old forest of rock maple was seen. One English visitor appeared very much pleased to learn that the Princess Alexandra had contributed a 200 stg. towards the construction of the pretty little church of quaint architecture with its large golden cross on the summit of the spire and which graces the top of the ridge from which could be seen at the distance of a mile and a half a large gathering of people who were taking part in the exhibition. On our arrival at the building we found a splendid collection of agricultural products. There were 380 entries, Mr. Applegard and Mr. Peterson being among the principal exhibitors. The neatness and taste exhibited in the arrangement of the vegetables were marked. There were cabbage and potatoes of gigantic size, turnips of many varieties, celery of two kinds in one of which the root alone was used. Five different kinds of beets were now shown, also leeks and onions, squash and pumpkins, Indian corn and cabb. Mr. Applegard's collection alone contained forty distinct varieties of vegetables. Excellent butter tempted the appetite, while Mr. Peterson had over thirty varieties of vegetables, including some curious and tortuous gourds, bearing the names of the Snake, Cucumber, and Hercules club.

It does not seem that the cruel river will recommence its wonted labors as a carrier until spring shall have loosened the icy fetters of winter and filled its channel with its flood. Enough of this. Description fails. Go and look at it.

This morning, Thursday, the 20th, the delegates and party left for Woodstock by the 8 o'clock train. Every facility was given them by the people of the country to see every variety of farms. They seemed to look with special delight on the noble old forest which crowns the hills of the Madawaska and Victoria. The more one sees of these gentlemen the more he will be satisfied of their intelligence and of their desire to become acquainted with our resources and to aid us in developing them. They were shown by the Surveyor General what the Province is capable of producing at New Brunswick and the public may rest assured that the season will not be lost upon them.

Nothing of interest occurred on our way down, as we were passing over ground previously travelled. They expressed themselves fully satisfied that New Brunswick could supply Great Britain with vast quantities of food and direct connection of steam between the two countries exist. They mentioned as articles of export, mutton, lamb, geese, fowls, and vegetables of various kinds. Salmon and bass were also spoken of.

When near Bath station 30 miles or more above Woodstock, the delegates accompanied by the Hon. W. E. Perley and the reporters of the Telegraph and Sun crossed over to the west side of the St. John, near the farm of the late Robert Kerr, one of the largest and best farms on the upper St. John. Here they were met after a little delay owing to some misunderstanding, by wagons which carried them to Centreville, between 20 and 30 miles from Woodstock. The road from Centreville to Woodstock is back of the lots fronting on the river, so that they were thus enabled to see not only the banks of the river in this fine section of the Saint John, but also to notice the extent of the good land to the west. Pleased with this charming and productive country, and who would not be pleased with it, they arrived late in the evening at Woodstock. I may add that the weather has been really charming since the delegates have been travelling through the Province; a little cool perhaps, but very clear, bright, healthy and invigorating. They seem to enjoy the air of New Brunswick, and I have heard them more than once express their satisfaction at its lightness and invigorating capabilities. That they are very highly delighted with our country can be gathered from every expression. The Government has done everything in their power to make their stay agreeable and has furnished them with all the means of information in its power.

**The Canada Pacific Railway.**

The importance of the early completion of the Fort William and Selkirk sections has been recognized by both the past and the present Government, and the work upon the same has been vigorously pushed forward and the line is expected to be in running order by the latter part of next summer. As soon as this section is completed, the older Provinces will have direct communication with Manitoba via Lake Superior. It is but reasonable to suppose, therefore, that

**MANITOBA'S NEXT SEASON'S CROPS**  
will find an outlet to the ocean via the lakes and Montreal. About a hundred and fifty miles of railway, leading west of Selkirk right into one of the most fertile portions of Manitoba will be completed about the same time, so that the rapid opening up and settlement of the country will at once act as a feeder to this section of the railway.
