**Forke Remains
Leader Of The Pro-
gressive Party**

Ottawa, May 6-- Robert
Forke, remained as leader of
the Progressive party, J. Fred
Johnston, has resigned as chief
whip and is replaced by C. W.
Stewart, Humboldt.

This was officially announc-
ed following a further caucus
of the progressive party ton-
night. It was further under-
stood, although not officially
announced that the caucus
left with the Ontario mem-
bers the nomination of a chair-
man of caucus to replace
Wilfred Kennedy, of Glen-
garry.

The official statement reads
as follows:

Following the division on
the budget a caucus of the
Progressive group was called
by Robert Forke, M. P. the
leader, to consider the situa-
tion created there-by and its
bearing on the future of the
Progressive movement. As a
result of a statement present-
ed by Mr. Forke and after
lengthy discussion, the resig-
nation of the officers and ex-
ecutive of the group were vol-
untarily handed in in order
that the members might pe-
fectly free to take what-
ever steps might be consid-
ered necessary.

Tonight's caucus ends the
long series of progressive de-
liberations which have been
under way, in one form or an-
other, since the vote on the
budget. The first formal caucus
was held yesterday when
Robert Forke submitted a
virtual ultimatum-insisting on
changes in the parliamentary
organization of the party as
conditional on his retention
of the party leadership. Cau-
cus adjourned till this morn-
ing and although there was
then nearly four and a half
hours of discussion the party
was unable to reach a final de-
cision and tonight met again.

It was only after further
long discussion tonight that
Mr. Forke was reaffirmed as
leader and a new chief whip
elected. J. Fred Johnston of
Last Mountain who is suc-
ceeded as Chief Whip by Mr.
Stewart of Humboldt, was one
of the seventeen Progressives
who voted with the govern-
ment on the main budget motion.

**Suggest Radio
Association Name
Local Committee**

According to replies receiv-
ed by the Moncton Radio As-
sociation to the messages for-
warded to Ottawa in connec-
tion with the proposal to levy
a royalty on the copyrighted
music broadcast from Canad-
ian radio stations, a parliam-
entary committee has been
appointed to deal with the
proposal and the local Ass-
ociation is asked to appoint a
committee to confer with the
legislators to whom the matter
has been referred.

The proposed tax was dis-
cussed at a recent meeting of
the local radio association and
it was decided to take up the
matter with Hon. A. B. Copp
Secretary of State, and urge
him to do all he could to an-
null the proposal as it was felt
that the matter is of vital im-
portance to all radio fans.
Telegrams were forwarded to
Premier King and Hon. A. B.
Copp, opposing the proposed
bill.

In radio circles it is stated
that if the bill goes through it
will mean the closing of Can-
adian broadcasting stations as
they will be unable to pay the
enormous sums which would be
royalties on the music which
they supply to the unseen
audiences from whom they
receive no remuneration.

Mr. F. Gordon Wright, B.
Sc., President of the local
radio association, said the
matter should receive the
earnest attention of the public
"I have heard considerable
opposition to the proposal ex-
pressed by radio people," said
Mr. Wright. "It is suggested
that all who are opposed to
the proposed legislation should
write to their representatives
at Ottawa.

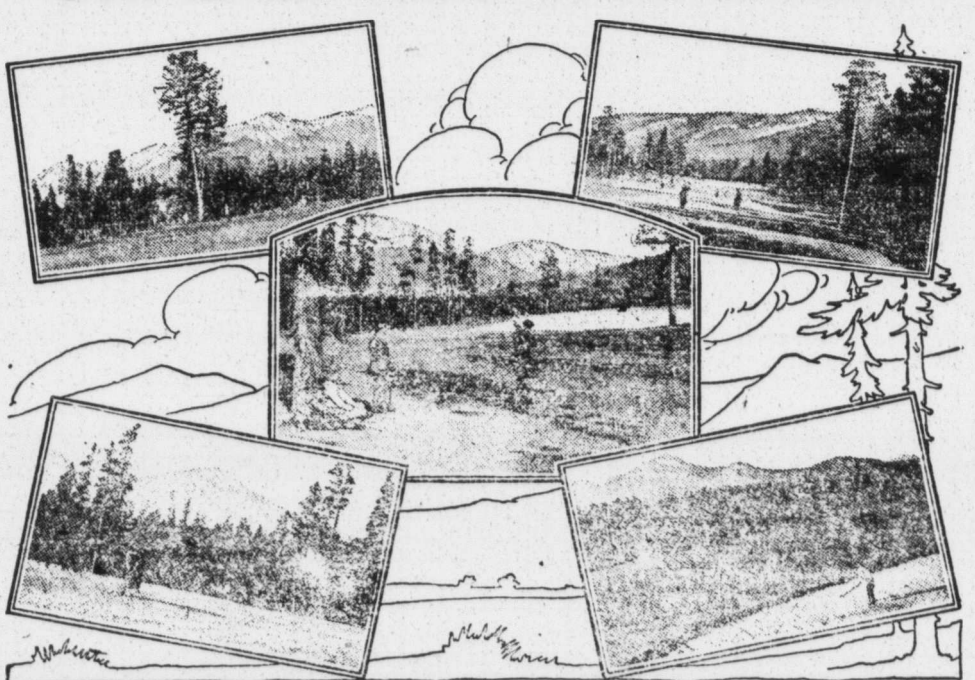

Golf in the Heart of the Rockies



Five views of the new Jasper Park Lodge Golf Course in Jasper National Park, Alberta.
This course will rank among the best playing courses on the continent and
it has the added feature of an incomparable scenic setting.

WHEN it was decided to add golf to
the pleasures of Jasper National
Park the policy adopted from the
outset was that the golf should be good
enough to be appreciated for itself, the
beauty of the scenery being merely an
added attraction. Since the course has
been cleared and is revealed to the visitor
he concludes that the Canadian National
Railways were fortunate to have such a
great extent of golfing terrain so imme-
diately available to the Lodge. A year
ago, when most of it was Rocky Moun-
tain forest, the golfing possibilities were
not so apparent. Work was commenced
early in the summer of 1924 and was
rushed forward with such success that
nine holes will be available for play dur-
ing the summer of 1925.

Fortunately there is no clay at Jasper.
This should delight the golfer's heart.
The underlying strata is generally gravel
like all the Athabaska River basin in
which Jasper is situated, so that the
fairways have under them that gravelly
subsoil essential to the production of good
golfing turf. Sand was also found on the
property in sufficient quantity and
quality to fill all requirements. The
fairways are clear of actual outcroppings
of rock, but these show up around trees
and greens, giving a pleasing rugged set-
ting but never interfering with the play.
