This was officially announcof the progressive party tonight. It was further understood. although not officially announced that the caucus left with the Ontario members the nomination of a chair-Wilfred Kennedy, of Glengarry.

The official statement reads as follows:



# Golf in the Heart of the Rockies

it has the added feature of an incomparable scenic setting.

it has the added feature of an incomparable scenic the allurements of Jasper National Park the policy adopted from the outset was that the golf should be good enough to be appreciated for itself, the beauty of the scenery being merely an added attraction. Since the course has been cleared and is revealed to the visitor he concludes that the Canadian National Railways were fortunate to have such a great extent of golfing terrain so immediately available to the Lodge. A year ago, when most of it was Rocky Mountain forest; the golfing possibilities were not so apparent. Work was commenced early in the summer of 1924 and was sushed forward with such success that nine holes will be available for play during the summer of 1925.

Fortunately there is no clay at Jasper. This should delight the golfer's heart. The underlying strata is generally graved like all the Athabaska River basin in which Jasper is situated, so that the fairways have under them that gravely

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
