



REFEREE TO BE CHOSEN TO-DAY FOR BIG BOUT

Name of the Third Man in the Ring to be Announced by Tex Rickard

Toledo, June 5.—Tex Rickard, promoter of the Willard-Dempsey fight is getting ready to spring another big surprise when he names the third man in the ring. It is said that Rickard has the man in mind already who will be agreeable to both Willard and Dempsey, and when the proper time arrives will let the cat out of the bag.

Rickard has the faculty of keeping the public in suspense on various points. He had the entire country guessing as to the battleground he would pick. Almost every nook and corner of the States was mentioned at one time or another, but Rickard kept to his knitting and when everything was set he announced that Toledo had been awarded the plum. It's the same thing in the referee question. This is almost as important as the fact that Willard and Dempsey are going to enter the ring. The fact that the battle will be 12 rounds for the championship, with a decision to be rendered, makes the name of him who will hold up the hand of the winner one of great importance. Everybody is guessing someone. So far half a dozen names have been mentioned. Here they say that it will be an Ohio man, Matt Kinkel was a leading candidate for the job but now it is said that Rickard may switch to someone else.

"Rickard is going to fool them all when it comes to picking a referee for the big battle," said a prominent party at the Toledo today.

They say it may be a great moving picture star. You see, there are certain interests who are doing everything possible in the way of legislation to prevent the bout, and if such a thing should be put over, then Rickard will have to be quite resourceful. I have it figured out from the information at hand that Rickard may name a prominent moving picture actor, and with him in the ring the bout can be billed in the nature of a moving picture stunt. This may be a favorable point when it comes to getting judicial protection. They can point out that Willard and Dempsey are legitimate actors working for a stated salary, and with the wonderful setting and a crowd of 75,000 seated all will be part of the company which is acting in the screen drama. Quite an idea, yes?

WHEN "ASSASSIN" MET "THUNDERBOLT"

Stanley Ketchel defeated Billy Papke in ten rounds at Milwaukee eleven years ago today, June 4, 1918. This was the first meeting between the "Assassin" and the "Thunderbolt," and the middleweight championship of the world was at stake. Ketchel claimed the title on the score of his defeats of Jack Twin Sullivan and Joe Thomas, while Papke alleged that his defeat of Hugo Kelly entitled him to the honor. The combatants had no sooner shaken hands than Ketchel landed a left on Billy's jaw that virtually decided the battle. Throughout the remainder of the battle Papke fought ferociously, but he was so dazed by that first terrific punch that he scarcely knew what he was doing. Ketchel won but by a narrow margin, and three more bouts, in one of which he was knocked out, were necessary before Ketchel proved to the fight fans that he was the better man.

DEMPSEY HAS STOPPED MEN JESS COULDN'T

There is small chance to draw a true line of comparison between Jess Willard and Jack Dempsey.

In the first place, the men are entirely different in style and temperament. Willard is slow, takes a lot of punishment, and is not the heavy puncher that Dempsey is. He fights because that is his business.

Dempsey is fast, punches with pile driving power, and fights because he likes it.

Records considered as matters of prowess, show four men who have faced each principal in Tex Rickard's big bout. They are Arthur Pelkey, Gunboat Smith, Charles Miller and Carl Morris.

Of the lot there isn't one who could last with Dempsey, and Willard didn't stop one of them.

Pelkey and Willard boxed 10 rounds in New York, and there was no decision. He lasted less than a round with Dempsey in Denver.

Gunboat Smith at that time at the very top of his career, gave Jess a fine cuffing in San Francisco, although the big champion always claimed the decision was wrong. This was a twenty-round go.

Dempsey met Smith twice, once getting a decision over him in a four-round bout in California and the second time stopping him in two rounds in Buffalo. Smith was floored nine times in the latter bout before he finally stayed down.

Charles Miller and Willard fought four rounds to a draw in California. It required less than a round for Miller to sleep when he met Dempsey.

Carl Morris and Willard staged a very tame bout in New York, the show going 10 rounds. Morris once lost to Dempsey on a foul in six rounds, after taking a beating. The next time Dempsey gave Carl the usual one-round dose.

Toronto to New York City.

A through train service from Toronto to New York City leaving Toronto 5.45 p.m. St. Catharines 7.50 p.m. daily was inaugurated by the Grand Trunk Railway on May 4th. This train carries through coaches and sleeping cars and arrives at New York at the Pennsylvania Terminal 33rd St. and 7th Avenue.

An Innovation in Educational Work Adopted by Sparks' Circus.

A temporary kindergarten that few boys and girls of this city know anything about will be established here next Monday. It is the school of the Sparks' circus. The youngsters of school age, as commonly accepted who are connected with the great travelling social aggregation that makes the human element of the circus attend daily school exercises and learn daily lessons just as do the other kiddies who live in houses and don't wear tight and spangles. There are half a hundred boys and girls, actual or adopted sons and daughters of the men and women performers or attendants of the circus Mrs. Emily Blackwell, "mother" of the big institution, is their school mistress. She gathers her pupils about her every afternoon when the crowds have left the "big top."

The circus boys and girls (most of them) have another kind of training on their daily schedules. They take their daily physical lesson, for most of them, if not already performing with some one of the numerous "families" of the rings, stages or trapezes, aspire to be heroes, acrobats or aloft, some day, and most of the best riders and gymnasts and acrobats and equilibrists have been reared with the smell of the sawdust continually in their nostrils.

The circus school is the most dramatic institution in the canvas colosseum. The little son of the boss manager man who may be trying out for a position on some acrobatic team is just as important a factor as the flaxen-haired daughter of the lady who dives from the dizzy dome of the tent and catches her breath on a splinter near the circus.
