Cheese-making in Carleton. The Woodstock Dispatch says that cheese-making in Carleton county closes this week for the season, and it is expected that the total output of all the factories will be 150 tons about the same as last year. The season has not been favorable. Pastures have been poor owing to the long drought. C. L. Tilley, who controls four of the ten factories in the county, says the supply of milk has been the poorest since cheese making was started in the county. The horn fly has made destructive work among the cattle, and with the dry pasturage has been a cause of the slim milk supply. It is also to be regretted that the market for cheese is not as favorable in this as in previous years. Everything else is away down in price, and cheese has naturally also taken a drop. Mr. Tilley has shipped a load of cheese, weighing something over a ton, direct to the London, Eng., market. Last year he had several orders from that city, but as the home market appeared to be as profitable he did not forward any of his product.

THE POST OFFICE ROBBERY.

A Little Colored Girl Confesses the Crime.

Through the energy and detective ability of Mr. Gerrard of the bank, N. A. assisted by the Police Magistrate and his men, the thief who stole the bank's letters from the post office box has been discovered. Mr. Gerrard notified all the banks in the city of the papers lost, and the first information he received was from the Merchant's bank, where on Wednesday, a colored girl named Waters, nine years old and living with her mother in Wilton's Alley presented a draft for sale. Mr. Mitchell promptly notified Mr. Gerrard and the girl was taken into custody. Shortly afterwards she confessed that she had taken letters from the box in the post office, and a search followed, which produced one of the school drafts and some other letters of no value addressed to the bank. There is no longer any doubt about her being the party. Two little boys were with her when she opened the box one and these have been rigidly examined, but without finding out anything more. The girl stated that she was shown how to open the box by these boys. She was let go after making the confession.

After she had told her story, Mr. Gerrard and Sergeant Phillips, accompanied by P. O. Inspector King, went to the house of Timothy Waters, the girl's father, and made a thorough search. They succeeded in finding a large number of papers, which was one of the missing school checks and a proof of a photograph, which had been addressed to Manager Taylor, from Halifax, a few days before the robbery occurred. What has become of the remainder of the papers is a mystery.

Mr. Gerrard told the Herald last night that the bank loses practically nothing by the thefts, but has sustained a great deal of inconvenience by the purloining of important papers. The thief gained access to the P. O. box by picking it with a nail.


The Tartars Boston.
