MR. TARTE'S OPINION OF LAURIER Sir Wilfrid Laurier has more than once been suspected of prevarication in dealing with public questions. The Prime Minister has answered many questions in Parliament in a vague way when the opposition desired to secure important information, and this is not as it should be. The head of the government of a great country should be above such demeaning subterfuge. But when we have the evidence of Hon. J. Israel Tarte, that Sir Wilfrid is untruthful when it suits his purpose, we can realize how difficult a position the present opposition occupy in discharging their duties as the critics of Canadian affairs. Mr. Tarte, when opposed to Sir Wilfrid, gave the present leader of the Government this doubtful certificate of character :-

"Mr. Laurier has commenced his electoral tour. Tomorrow he will speak at Stanfold. He will probably have an opponent, and will say all the untruthful things that he considers useful in his own defence. Mr. Laurier is a man not wanting in polish, but he is without large ideas. His polished manners, his abstinence a certain ability in concealing his principles not far removed from hypocrisy, have won for him his popularity in the country." (Signed) "J. ISRAEL TARTE."
