FISHERY DISPUTE.

Interview With the Premier

As the reference of the Fishery is
due to the Hague Tribunal, and its
outcome the determination of the
competability of the Newfoundland
fishery laws and regulations with the
Convention are now national ques-
tions and not party issues, this morn-
ing we asked the Premier for an in-
terview on the Washington Confer-
ence, from which he returned yester-
day. Sir Edward kindly accorded it
and explained that the business ac-
tually finalized related to the pro-
cedure to settle present and future
disputes.

It was determined that both present
and future difficulties should be set-
tled, if possible, by diplomacy. If this
course failed, then a reference should
be made to the Permanent Fishery
Commission provided under the Award
of last September. As regards the
objections to the fishery laws and re-
gulations by the United States, the
settlement of this was a matter for
the future. Whereas there was only
three important issues raised by Am-
erica against Canadian rules, there
were many more raised against those
of Newfoundland. There was, how-
ever, a disposition shown by America
to come to terms. But no settlement
as to the American objections had
been arranged as yet, though he ex-
pected something might be done with-
in the next few months.

The fact that America had given
way to Canada on the question of
further setting fishing and Sunday
were points that would tell in
favour of Newfoundland; but it did
not follow that the Americans would
be so complaisant with Newfoundland
as with Canada. With the latter there
was no fishery dispute. With New-
foundland there was, and America
must hold out against us on these
points for terms.

We thanked the Premier for the
interview he had accorded us, and
withdrew.

SOME REFLECTIONS ON THE SITUATION.

Yesterday we expressed an opinion
that it would be better to let America
go to the Hague than to give way on
pure fishing. To-day we are more
strongly confirmed than ever in the
opinion we expressed yesterday.

Better still, wait and see if
Canada fails in the Rectiprocity
negotiations; and if she does, let
these questions be merged in the
general and larger question of
Free Port for Free Entry and a
general Rectiprocity scheme.

So said we yesterday. So say we
to-day. We have had a hard fight
over this Fishery Question. We won
a brilliant victory at the Hague. We
must see that we get the full fruits
of that victory. And we believe we
shall.

We believe America is not con-
cerned one bit about our fishery laws
and regulations except as grounds on
which to raise objections to obtain
free bait in summer and herring in
winter. These are her objectives. We
want to give them to her on terms.
If we show a disposition to give them
only for a proper consideration,
meanwhile holding our own, as the
Hague Tribunal has defined it, we
shall win out, even though we have

to fight alone and although Canada
has come to terms and got out. New-
foundland has shown before to-day
she can paddle her own canoe. Nfld.
is not anxious to fight it out; she
is wishing to get to business on equal-
able terms, i.e., on the basis of "her
own," as the Hague Tribunal deter-
mined it.

Canada Goes It Alone.

Special Evening Telegram.

OTTAWA, Noon.
An official statement of the result
of the fishery negotiations at Wash-
ington was made in the House of Com-
mons, by Aylesworth, the Minister of
Justice. It appears that the United
States and Newfoundland were so far
apart in their contentions that an un-
derstanding could not easily be reached,
and therefore with the consent of New-
foundland, the Conference arrange-
ed for a discussion of the differences
between Canada and the United
States.

The States objected to the Canadian
regulations prohibiting the use of a
purse seine, the prohibition of Sun-
day fishing, and to American fisher-
men being required to take out Cana-
dian licenses, and to Canadian offi-
cials boarding American fishing ves-
sels, if infractions of regulations was
suspected. Sir Alan said there had
been little difficulty in convincing the
representatives of the States that
there was nothing unduly burdensome
in the provision for boarding sus-
pected vessels, or in the prohibition
against Sunday fishing, etc. There was
more difficulty about the licensing
provision.

Robbery in West End.

A daring robbery was committed in
broad daylight opposite Brennan's
building, corner of George Street and
Prince's Street, this morning. Mr.
Thomas Whitten came in from Petty
Harbor this morning to buy flour and
other groceries. Knowing that the
day would turn out wet he brought
with him a large boat's sail to cover
the groceries on the slide going home
to Petty Harbor, and thereby keep his
goods from getting spoiled with the
rain. He left his horse and slide near
Monroe's store (Brennan building)
George St., and went down to Water
Street to complete his purchases.
While he was absent a sneak thief
stole the sail off the slide and made
off with it. The police have been in-
formed and Whitten has given them a
good clue to work on.

down by a fierce gust of wind. As it
fell a boy was passing near and had
to run to get clear of the falling ob-
ject. He had such a close call for
his life that the top of the ladder hit
him in the foot. Had he been a few
feet to the rear he would have been
brained.

Royal Bank in Very Strong Position

Annual Statement Shows Large In-
crease in Amount of Assets in
Specie and Dominion Government
Notes. Year Showed Record Earn-
ings.

Even at a time when a number of
banks are placing their annual state-
ments before the public, that of the
Royal Bank of Canada will attract
particular attention, because of the
large transactions with which the
Bank has been identified during the
course of the past year. The most im-
portant of the latter was perhaps the
acquisition by the Royal of the Union
Bank of Halifax, as this deal con-
tributed, to quite a large extent, to
the phenomenal increase shown in
the statement as of December 31st, in
the aggregate assets, as well as in the
total deposits and increases in both
paid up capital and reserve fund.

The fact, however, that the consoli-
dation was only effected on November
1st, leaving only two months of the
year for the operation of the Joint in-
stitution, indicates that practically the
whole of the record net profits shown
for the year were obtained for the
operation of the Royal Bank itself.

The net profits of the year ending
December 31st, 1910, reached the total
of \$951,286.99, equal to 18.29 p.c. on
the average paid up capital for the
year of \$5,200,000. These earnings
compared with \$838,306.51 show an in-
crease of \$112,980.48.

One of the outstanding features of
the statement, viewed from the stand-
point of conservatism, would seem to
be the very large increases in the
amount of the assets of the Bank, re-
presented by specie and Dominion
Government notes, the gold and silver
coin now standing at \$4,141,664.09,
compared with \$3,660,347.62 at the
end of the previous year, while Do-
minion Government notes now total
\$8,530,488.25. Against \$4,992,532.25 at
the end of 1909, showing an increase
for the both accounts of approxi-
mately \$4,113,006.00.

As indicating the very important
position the Royal Bank of Canada
now holds among the leading banks of
the country, its aggregate assets now
stand at \$92,510,346.95 as against \$67,
051,102.62 at the end of the previous
year. Of this amount \$52,471,208.98
are represented by current loans and
discounts against \$33,644,706.10 at the
end of the previous year. This big
increase in current loans has been
rendered possible by the growth of
deposits, these now totalling \$72,097,
667.27, as against \$50,823,129.31 at the
end of the previous year. Of this
amount deposits bearing interest
amount to \$51,709,181.96 as against
\$33,356,828.85 at the end of the pre-
vious year, while deposits not bearing
interest amount to \$19,757,130.49
against \$17,955,930.07 at the end of
1909. An issue of new stock made
during the course of the year was re-
sponsible for a big increase both in
the paid up capital and in the reserve
fund, the capital now standing at \$6,
200,000.00 against \$5,000,000.00 at the
end of 1909. The average paid up capital
during the year, however, was only
\$5,200,000.00. The reserve fund made
a big advance from \$5,700,000.00 to
\$7,000,000.00, the sum of \$1,300,000.00
of this increase being from premium
on new stock, and \$100,000.00 being
transferred from profit and loss ac-
count.

ing, when Mr. Joseph Williams, of
Bay Bulls, led to the altar Miss Ma-
tilda Swain. Rev. Fr. McDermott tied
the nuptial knot. The groom was at-
tended by his brother, Mr. Augustus
Williams, while the bride was sup-
ported by her sister-in-law, Miss
Louise Williams. Constable John Nu-
gent, of the West End, brother-in-law
of the bride, gave her away, and his
daughter, little Annie Nugent, acted
as flower girl. After the ceremony a
number of the friends of the happy
pair drove to the Osborne Hotel where
a reception was held and a very pleas-
ant time was spent. Amongst the
many valuable presents which the
bride received was a purse containing
\$80 in gold from Hon. Jas. McLaugh-
lin. The bride and groom leave for
their future home at Bay Bulls to-
morrow. The Telegram extends its
congratulations.

Missionary Meeting at Topsail.

That Missionary zeal is not on the
wane was evidenced by the meeting in
the cause of Missions held in the
Methodist Church, at Topsail, Wednes-
day evening. Despite the long drive
and keen frost, about thirty ladies and
gentlemen went in from town and
united with the Methodists of that
community in a remarkably bright
and enthusiastic Missionary Meeting.
The comfort of the visitors was well
looked after by Mr. and Mrs. Butler
who placed the rooms of the Octagon
Hotel at their disposal, not for the
first time, however, as year after year
the deputation from the city has been
welcomed and cared for by the prop-
rietors of this Hotel. At 7.30 the
little Church was comfortably filled,
and for two hours the audience list-
ened with interest to the various items
of the programme, the general com-
plaint being that the Service was too
brief. Mr. R. F. Horwood, as Chair-
man, helped considerably in making
the service the success it was. After
preliminary exercises and the reading
of extracts from the General Report
of the Missionary Work of Canadian

showing that the Church had already
done towards the solution of the Mis-
sionary Problem and emphasizing the
truth that "We can do it, if we will,
for God will." The choir, under the
leadership of Mr. Allan Nurse, led the
singing, two of its members, Misses
Butler and Miller, also rendering very
sweetly the duet: "Will there be any
Stars in my Crown?" Four of the
visiting deputation, Messrs. Tucker and
Steel, contributed a very pleasing
quartet. In his report the Pastor
gave the Missionary earnings of Topsail
for the past year as \$54.00 and plead-
ed for a substantial increase. The
congregation loyally responded, cheer-
ing their Pastor's heart by a collection
of over \$60.00 towards the Missionary
