The large meeting of the members of the T. A. & B. Society held last night in their hall shows how that body appreciates those who are interested in the curtailing of the sale of strong drink, and Mr. L. Griffin, V.P., and the Executive, who are responsible for this emergency meeting, are to be congratulated for so doing, thereby giving the members collectively an opportunity of appending their names to the petition about to be presented to the House of Assembly for the early closing of the saloons. The meeting was a most enthusiastic one from start to finish. Rev. Fr. O'Callaghan, who was present and who has been working most indefatigably in the movement the past fortnight, addressed the meeting for upwards of half an hour and told his hearers of the misery now existing in our midst, caused by over-indulgence in strong drink, unfortunately, and especially among the fine and hardy laborers of St. John's, and that every effort should be put forth by the T. A. & B. Society to save their fellowman and their families from destruction. He sincerely thanked the Executive for the courtesies extended to him in calling a meeting on his behalf, and which was so nobly responded to by the members in attending in such large numbers, for it shows that the Society is in sympathy with the movement of early closing of the "pubs" which, if passed by the Legislature and turned into law, will be an everlasting benefit to those families whose heads are addicted to over-indulgence in strong drink. The rev. gentleman remarked that he was not surprised at the great enthusiasm prevailing in the ranks of the T. A. & B. Society about this very important matter. It was only what he expected, for was it not in keeping with the wording of the pledge of Total Abstinence to discountenance intemperance in others. He was pleased and delighted with the reception given him and the cause of which he had at heart. To-night, he said, there are upwards of 20 volunteers around the city streets soliciting signatures to the petition. Can any body of men do more by their actions? They have given me and others interested in this crusade an impetus to still continue in our noble object, i.e., to try and suppress the liquor traffic.

At the conclusion of his address the members standing cheered the rev. gentleman and wished him God speed in the great work that he has identified himself in for the benefit of fallen men and their families. These men who had not previously signed then came forward and in a most independent manner signed the petition. The meeting then adjourned.

Cable News.

BOSTON, March 20.

Fully 125 persons perished through accidents which befell New England, Canadian, Newfoundland and other craft which met disaster in the Western Upper North Atlantic waters during the fall and winter season. It is impossible to account for the exact number of lives lost, as the missing Gloucester schooner Ella M. Goodwin, with her crew of 10, may be adrift in the northern icefields. The statistics of lost Newfoundland fishermen are incomplete. One hundred vessels ran ashore, were sunk, abandoned, burned or in collision during the past six months, 75 schooners, 2 barges, 2 brigantines, 2 tugs, one \$25,000 auxiliary steam yacht and one power boat. The Maritime Provinces were remarkably free from fatalities, although many from that section of Canada were lost in wrecks or elsewhere perished. Several craft are long posted as missing. The combined financial loss is estimated at \$1,000,000. Some hope is still entertained that the 10 men, all Nova Scotians (one is a Newfoundland), who sailed from Bay of Islands in the schr. Ella M. Goodwin on Jan. 21st are safe. A vessel believed to be the Goodwin was sighted in the dense icefields in the Gulf of St. Lawrence several days after she sailed. If the Goodwin is still afloat she will not be released before April 15th.

LONDON, March 20.

Weaving of the cloth of gold for the Coronation robes of King George and Queen Mary has commenced at Messrs. Warner's silk works at Braine-tree. By order of the Queen, who is interested in the British silk industry, the material will be entirely of English make. The cloth will consist of silk material, into which will be woven threads of pure gold. When finished, the cloth will be insured for £500, and taken to the London School of Art needle work, where it will be made into robes for the King and Queen. Queen Mary has already begun the fascinating task of overhauling her fine collection of jewels. The Queen's most prized possessions is the magnificent coronet of India, consisting of diamonds designed in alternation of fleur de lys and maltese crosses. It was usually worn by the late Queen Victoria in her young days. Previous to the departure of their foreign guests, the King and Queen intend giving a party in the grounds of Buckingham Palace on the lines of the Buckingham Garden Party at Windsor.

HALIFAX, March 20.

The s.s. Cacoon arrived this morning from Lunenburg. She reports having passed a ship on Friday night between Point Esprit and Canoe, standing S.W. She showed no lights, but could be plainly seen by moonlight. She had no topmasts, and carried foresail and storm trysail set. The ship is believed to be the Ella M. Goodwin.

Golden Hind's Rough Passage.

The brigtn. Golden Hind, Capt. Geo. Herald, arrived here from Barbados yesterday at 6 p.m. after a run of 32 days, with molasses to Bishop, Sons & Co. From the start the vessel had bad weather, and on reaching the Banks the storms were terrible. The wind blew with hurricane force, high seas ran, one of which smashed the rudder post, and temporary repairs were effected after the weather became moderate. After making Cape Race it again became stormy and the vessel had to shelter at St. Mary's. She was towed down by the Ingham and fortunately escaped last night's gale.

Will Use Trawls.

Several fishermen went to Brigus and Bay Roberts yesterday to negotiate the purchase of schooners for the Labrador fishery at those places. This season on the Labrador many will bring trawl gear and dories in their vessels, so that if the inshore fishery fails, as it did last summer, they can go on the outer grounds and use trawls. They hope by this means to secure a voyage no matter how fortune may turn for them.
