The True Inwardness of the Situation.

We re-publish to-day Hon. John Harvey's letter, in which a misplaced line and an omitted one considerably detracted from its intelligibility yesterday. In considering this matter it should be borne in mind that the intimation in the press, which apparently bears the imprimatur of Secretary Knox, that he is unwilling to negotiate with Newfoundland for Reciprocity, but that he considers that entry into the Newfoundland markets and the free fishing privileges, herring for food, cod, salmon and other free fishing is insufficient, but that Newfoundland must throw in the free export of pulpwood. This latter, which involves a change of policy and an amendment of the law, is believed to be the gravamen of the whole difficulty which Senator Knox is forecasting. It must be remembered that under the Reciprocity arrangement with the Dominion the latter cannot give the States free pulpwood, as it is a Provincial matter, and Provinces like Quebec are bitterly opposed to the granting of this concession. What the States has failed to get from Canada, Secretary Knox evidently is making a sine qua non for Reciprocity with Newfoundland. It is known that Newfoundland can get Reciprocity any time, if she will consent to sacrifice the chance of erecting more pulp and paper mills here and agree to cater to American pulp and paper mills. Secretary Knox is evidently putting out a feeler to Newfoundland. Will Premier Morris stand to his guns?

Hints to Householders.

STOLE MONEY AND GOODS.—Two small boys were arrested yesterday by Const. Tobin for stealing cigarettes and oranges from the stores of Messdames Wallace and Colford on Carter's Hill on Monday. They entered each place stealthily and stole 40 cents from one store and 84 cents from another. The lads to-day were brought before the court but owing to their youth were reprimanded and released.
