Special Evening Telegram.
ST. JOHN, N. B., Aug. 19.
There was an earthquake shock at
Hartland, New Brunswick, this morn-
ing. The plaster was shaken off the
walls in some of the houses.

NEW YORK, Aug. 19.
District Attorney Fash was shot and
seriously wounded to-day at Staten
Island. The shooting was done by a
Mrs. Evans, who is believed to be
mentally deranged because of family
troubles which brought her into con-
tact with Fash.

LONDON, Aug. 19.
Exaggerated rumours of plots and
mutinies in the Russian Black Sea
and Baltic fleets, have been received.
The St. Petersburg correspondent of
the Times says, as a result of mar-
tial law proclaimed at Sebastopol
and Kronstadt. This is merely pre-
cautionary, the correspondent adds,
and taken for the purpose of suppress-
ing revolutionary agitators.

LONDON, Aug. 19.
The United States Embassy to-day
received a reply from the British
Foreign Office to President Taft's in-
vitation to participate in the Panama-
Pacific Exposition. The Government
is disposed to accept the invitation,
but its final decision will be influ-
enced partly by the possibility of arriv-
ing at a satisfactory settlement with

the exposition authorities in regard to
the accommodation to be provided for
the British Exhibition. No hint is
given in the reply with respect to
other possible influences which may
affect the British decision, but it is
evident that a loophole has been left
for a refusal on account of unfavor-
able Canal legislation.

EASTBOURNE, England, Aug. 19.
Capt. Hicks Murray, an officer at-
tached to the Gordon Highlanders,
who had seen much service in India,
shot and killed his two daughters
wounded his wife, and then commit-
ted suicide. He is supposed to have
become suddenly insane. After the
crime was committed, the house in
which he had resided was mysteri-
ously burned to the ground. The
wife escaped. Five bodies were found
in the ruins, two of which were not
identified. Capt. Murray let a letter,
in which he said: "I am hopelessly
ruined, and for this reason killed all
those dependent upon me. Should
like all buried in one grave. God for-
give me."

LONDON, Aug. 19.
Albanian insurgents have decided
to march on Salonika, and a detach-
ment has already occupied the city of
Keprubi. On receipt of this news
the Turkish cabinet was called, and
resolved to resist the advance of the
insurgents. The situation in Albania
is grave. Assassination of officers
continue. According to information
cabled by the Constantinople corre-
spondent of the Daily Telegraph, the
insurgents intend to force the Gov-

Hr. Grace Notes.

CETTINGE, Montenegro, Aug. 19.
Massacres of Christians in Berama
district of Albania, continue. A num-
ber of Christian villages have been
set on fire by the Turkish artillery.
On Friday a band of Mohammedans
supported by Turkish troops attacked
a section of the Christian population
close by the Montenegrin frontier, and
a large number of women and child-
ren were slain. Several young girls
are said to have been carried off by
the Mohammedans.

LONDON, Aug. 19.
The British Government has accept-
ed the Austro-Hungarian invitation to
the Powers to exchange views regard-
ing the position in the Balkan provin-
ces of the Turkish Empire, for which
Count Berchtold, the Austrian fore-
ign minister, had proposed to endeav-
our to secure gradual autonomy.

NEW YORK, Aug. 19.
The Salvation Army headquarters
here announced to-day that Evange-
line Booth had received a cable saying
that her father was fast sinking, and
that death was expected at any time.

FOLLADEN, Northumberland,
August 19.
A party of suffragettes waylaid
Sir Edward Grey while leaving church
yesterday. Grey at first refused to
discuss the question there, but the
women declared that the opportunity
for discussion had been denied them
elsewhere. He refused to receive a
delegation of women, whereupon one
demanded—How dare you betray the
women's cause by allowing a reform
bill to be drafted to include men only.
Grey responded that he had put down
an amendment to the bill giving wo-
men also the suffrage. You know that
amendment was no use, the women
shouted. Grey replied, you know noth-
ing about parliamentary procedure or
you would not say that. After furth-
er talk, Sir Edward ran to his motor,
in which he dashed away from the
scene.

LONDON, Ont., Aug. 15.—William
Dillon, a prominent Sarnia business
man, was so horribly burned near
here last evening when his big tour-
ing car caught fire after over-turning
that grave fears are retained for his
recovery. Dillon with a boy of fifteen,
named Lucas, was on his way to
Arkona from Grand Bend and about
9.15 attempted to pass a buggy on a
narrow piece of roadway on the
town line. When he turned out, his
car went over the edge of the road
and overturned twice before it came
to a stand, bottom up at the em-
bankment. Lucas was thrown out
but Mr. Dillon, who was driving was
held under the steering wheel.

143 Fishermen Drowned in Gale

San Sebastian, Spain, Aug. 16.—
Official returns show that altogether
143 fishermen were drowned in the
gale which for two days has swept
Spanish coast. King Christina has
headed a public subscription which is
being collected to aid the families of
the victims. In addition the King has
sent his private secretary to Bermeo
a seaport town on the Bay of Biscay,
near Bilbao, where most of the fisher-
men came from, to give pecuniary re-
lief to the widows.
