HAD A TRIUMPHANT MARCH THROUGH TRINITY DISTRICT.

NEW HARBOR, To-day. Leaving Trinity on Monday the Liberal candidates made Thorofore is a stiff breeze after nightfall. When their presence became known the settlement was illumined by the burning

At night they held a meeting at Scilly Cove, packed by a most enthusiastic body of Liberal and Union supporters. The speakers each received a great ovation. On Thursday afternoon they held a fine meeting at Heart's Delight and were greeted with rapturous applause. Two Tory heeleders who interrupted were given a dressing down by Lloyd they will not soon forget. After an insulting remark the chief heeler left the hall amidst the jeers of the assembly. Lloyd to wait the castigation Lloyd invited him to remain for. At night a fine meeting was held at Green's 'erbour, which is overwhelmingly Liberal and gave them a good time. On Friday they drove to Cavendish and were greeted with guns and given a great time at the meeting. On their way back they held an open air meeting at Whiteway, to the intense satisfaction of the people. Mr. Leander Dwyer told the assembly that he was out for the Liberal and Union party as they would give them a Government which would be best for the country.
