INTEREST.

Interest is something which a bank gets for loaning money. It now and then gets something else which it was not looking for at the time and failed to see coming.

If it were not for interest we would not have any marble-tiled banks in this country and the number of automobiles per capita would fall off faster than the birth rate of France. Whenever a man enters a bank and wants to borrow enough money to buy two or three potatoes or a diamond solitaire, the cashier will produce a small legal document with a time-clock attachment, called a note.
