

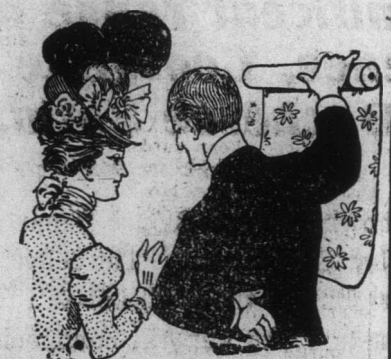

THE INDIAN.
