

The Yarmouth Murder Case.

PERRY SENT UP FOR TRIAL IN JUNE.

Yarmouth, April 29.—Clara Elizabeth Perry, widow of Capt. George Perry, who was charged with the murder of her husband, was brought before Stipendiary Pelton this morning and was committed for trial for the June sitting of the Supreme Court. There was a very large gathering outside of the police court but, despite that, Mrs. Perry took little or no notice of any person and walked into the court with her usual reserved manner. She was accompanied by ex-Chief of Police Babine and Mansfield Ross, her daughter, Miss Eleanor Perry, and her son, Mr. Perry retained her calm disposition throughout. She showed considerable nervousness. As entered, his usual smile was manifest but as Stipendiary Pelton opened his court he lost his composure and sat through the proceedings, with his face resting in his right hand.

The Magistrate's Decision.

Stipendiary Pelton read his decision as follows:

The King and Clara Elizabeth Perry, defendant in examination.

After carefully perusing the depositions of the witnesses taken before me on this preliminary examination and the cases submitted by the learned counsel for both the Crown and the defence, I have come to the conclusion that it is my duty to commit the accused to trial. I do not consider it my duty, and feel that it would be improper for me as a magistrate to make any comment on the evidence produced, except to say that I am doubtful in my own mind as to whether or not some of the evidence tendered is admissible. This, however, is a matter for the trial judge to pass upon and I think there is sufficient evidence altogether circumstantial to send the accused before the Grand Jury for its opinion.

I wish to express my regret that some of the newspapers of the Province have seen fit to publish columns of reports in connection with the case which were largely idle gossip and hearsay evidence. All these things are, of course, inadmissible as evidence in the British Court of Justice, but a tremendous amount of harm may be done to an accused person, however innocent and is presumed to be innocent until convicted and found guilty, by the publication of such reports. I do not remember in my connection with Magisterial work of ever before having seen, in this Province, a case where an accused person was condemned in the eyes of the public by the publication of evidence taken before a coroner's jury, purely circumstantial and a large part of it inadmissible and I would respectfully suggest that something would be done in the way of legislation, if necessary, to prevent a recurrence of this mode of influencing the minds of a jury which has to decide a question of life or death before the case is properly placed before it I commit the accused, Clara Elizabeth Perry, for trial.

Mrs. Perry, after Stipendiary Pelton completed the decision, held a brief consultation with her solicitor, R. W. Ross. Action was then taken to bind over the witnesses for the June hearing. Ross' case will be continued on Monday morning when several more witnesses are to be heard.

As Mrs. Perry, in company with the ex-Chief of Police and Ross, left the court room, she appeared to feel her position keenly and as she passed out of the door three standing near plainly observed signs of much emotion. Ross who had lost his smile entirely.

Burgoo Fishery Report.

The Board of Trade received the following report from Sub-Collector Cunningham, Burgoo, yesterday, giving the fishery report from Connors to Red Island for the week ending April 23:—Total landed to date 900 tons; total for week 130; no trawls in the water; 60 boats fishing. A good sign of cod in deep water, but herring scarce. The weather for the week was changeable, winds moderate, for not far from the land. The first cod since January caught this week, one boat getting 4 gals. for one day, but many getting little or none. The catch to date is the worst for 40 years. We have no bankers or scholers of any kind fishing, and merchants will hardly buy green fish. This is making it hard for fishermen who are not supplied.

In Aid of Beaumont Hamel.

A sale of work, the proceeds of which go to the Beaumont Hamel Fund, will be held in Canon Wood Hall this afternoon and night. Excellent assortments of fancy goods have been arranged for sale. Ice cream and afternoon teas will also be served. The affair is being held under the auspices of the St. Margaret's Guild and should be well patronized.

Tennis Club Meeting.

A meeting of the Executive of the Newfoundland Tennis Club was held at 12.30 p.m. yesterday in the office of Mr. H. A. Winter, B.A., Board of Trade Building. Several matters of importance were discussed, including an invitation from Mr. L. R. Cooper of Grand Falls, asking that a team be sent over to represent St. John's against Grand Falls. No definite decision was made on this matter. Mr. J. Paterson was elected temporary Secretary of the Club in place of Mr. Fred R. Macpherson who resigned. Before the meeting closed it was decided to hold a general meeting on the 12th inst., when officers for the coming season will be elected and other matters of importance will be discussed.

Stolen Car Found.

Enquiries were being conducted all yesterday for the Palco car owned by Sir Michael Cashin and stolen from the R. C. Cathedral grounds while he was attending prayers on Sunday night. Late yesterday evening Sir Michael was informed that at 10.30 on Sunday night a large car with three occupants had passed through Holyrood. Last night word was sent by Mr. Lewis of Holyrood that a Palco car 1244 was stalled about 3 miles East of Holyrood, with its steering gear bent and having other minor damages. Sir Michael's chauffeur went out to Holyrood this morning to effect repairs and bring the machine to town. A description of one of the young men who was seen getting aboard the car at the Cathedral grounds has been given the police, and three strangers visited the well known house at Holyrood yesterday, so that it is likely the perpetrators of the theft will shortly be apprehended.

Rebirth of normal business awaits a new attitude of man toward his job.

James S. Alexander, President of the National Bank of Commerce in New York, said last night (Friday, April 23), in an address before the semi-annual meeting of the National Association of Cotton Manufacturers at Boston, Mass. Correcting of the business and social confusion of the times must be sought, he urged, not only in technical banking and business adjustments, but more particularly in the human element, which has set free forces that must be brought under control before business can again be on a sound basis. Mr. Alexander's subject was "The Basis of Better Times."

"Never before in the history of the world has there been such a universal and profound change in human conduct as we have seen in the period since the World War began," Mr. Alexander declared. "Never before has human conduct produced such variations in business away from what we are accustomed to consider a normal course."

"It is a question of the personal attitude of man toward his job. Looking at this in a large way we see nations still struggling and fighting one with another. Within nations we see labor still creating turmoil, while the attitude of employers is not always what it should be. Business stability and a new normal for the conduct of the world's economic life cannot be found while these conditions persist."

"To many people to-day hope and expect something will be done for them, although their interests would best be served by their doing a full day's work for their pay. There is an effort on the part of workers to retain the advantages won during the abnormal war period of shorter hours, higher pay and easy work, regardless of the present lack of an economic basis for the continuance of such conditions. The fundamental principle of enlightened labor leadership to-day should be to inculcate a return to the doctrine of an honest day's work for honest day's pay. Inflated wages and the non-competitive conditions of the war and the later boom period produced inefficiency and irresponsibility. It is essential to the welfare of labor itself to banish this attitude, not because individual efficiency and a full return of value received in the pay envelope mean higher profits for the employer, but because they mean better times for the workers themselves. Workers cannot in the long run, consume more than they produce. If wages are too high in relation to the exchange value of the product, wages must come down, for no wage can be permanently maintained at a point above what it is worth measured in terms of other products."

National Bank of Commerce.

President Delivers Address on Rebirth of Business.

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"Further, employers must not seek to drive wages below their true value thus measured. There is this reciprocal personal responsibility involved in the relation of workers and em-

ployers—on the one hand to render efficient service for every dollar demanded, on the other to render over to labor every dollar earned.

"There are elements of personal responsibility in banking relations also that must be maintained on high standards. It is not sufficient for a banker in loaning money merely to consider whether it is going to be safe and profitable for his own bank. Neither is it sufficient to add to this the consideration as to whether it is going to help the customer make a profit. He must consider these things. But he must also consider whether, from the point of view of public interest, it is a good and constructive thing to do. He must consider whether society needs that activity or whether the general situation will be better off without it. The times are still too serious for wasted effort, for unproductive enterprise or for irresponsible ventures."

"Never has the moral responsibility of governments been greater. Any government that countenances privileges to any class as against another class on the ground of social justice undermines the stability of society. For as in America, a particularly encouraging circumstance is the broad-minded, sound, human and intelligent way in which the present administration is attacking the problems of the day."

"A return of social stability rests upon recognition by both nations and individuals that reconstruction can come only by hard work, that business can endure only on the basis of a sincere discharge of obligations, whether they be in the form of executive duties or in the form of day's labor, and that a high sense of personal responsibility must prevail in all the relations of life."

"The most frequently asked questions of the day is when we may expect a return to normal business. Forecasts based only on technical business considerations are worth little. The rebirth of normal business awaits a new attitude of man toward his job."

Referring to the credit situation, Mr. Alexander said: "The remedy is not to be found in easier credits or cheaper money, which might serve as an artificial but temporary stimulant, creating a situation worse than the present one. The availability of credit must depend squarely and without equivocation on the individual position of the borrower. No man is entitled to banking credit unless the business ende to which he intends to put it contain in themselves elements insuring his financial ability to repay."

"Any other policy than that indicated by these limitations would mean an inflated state of credit and an unsound banking situation. Any other policy would retard the sound readjustment of business and perpetuate an expansion which cannot and should not be maintained."
