UNION PACIFIC NET
\$39,992,206 IN 1923
Road's Earnings After Preferred Dividends, Equal to \$16.16 a Share on Common.
NEW YORK, April 12. — The Union Pacific Railroad Company's net income from all sources in 1923

was \$39,992,206 after the payment of taxes and charges. This, after provision for sinking fund requirements and preferred dividends, is equivalent to \$16.16 a share earned on the \$222,291,600 common stock outstanding, and compares with \$12.75 a share earned in 1922. The surplus after dividends was \$13,192,569, against \$6,119,406 the previous year, which brings the profit and loss surplus at the close of 1923 up to \$167,143,109.

An increase in the income from transportation, the annual report made public yesterday states, was largely due to the gain in operating revenues, which amounted to \$211,318,465, as compared with \$192,877,121 the previous year. The increase of \$15,149,322 in freight revenue was due to the increase of 13.1 per cent, in net ton miles of revenue freight carried, partly offset by a decrease in freight rates.

The principal causes for the increase in volume of traffic, according to the report, were absence of strike conditions, increased production of fruit and vegetables along the line, improved market conditions except grain, and the improved building activity. Shipments of automobiles to the West increased greatly the revenue, being 56 per cent. more than in the previous year.

TO-DAY'S MESSAGES

A HOLOCAUST.
RICHMOND, Va., April 21. Charles Berniechi lost his life and 165 horses and mules were burned to death in a fire which destroyed the southern dock yards here to-day causing damage estimated at \$300,000.

EXPLODING BOMB CAUSES SERIOUS INJURY.

NEW YORK, April 22. Four persons were injured one seriously and several hundred persons were thrown into a panic early to-day when a bomb exploded in front of an east side tenement. Scores of windows were shattered. The injured persons told the police that they were standing in front of a small shop when the blast occurred. They expressed the opinion that the bomb had been thrown at them from a window.

THE COST OF ABOLISHING THE 12 HOUR DAY.

HOBOKEN N.J., April 22. Abolition of the 12 hour day in the steel industry is costing the United States Steel Corporation about \$35,000,000 annually and is adding ten per cent to the cost of operation, chairman E. H. Garry told the stockholders at the annual meeting to-day.

SENIOR TRADE COMMISSIONER RECEIVES NEW APPOINTMENT.

MONTREAL, April 22. R. W. Dalton the senior trade commissioner for the Imperial Government in Canada and Newfoundland is being transferred from the office here to another branch of the Imperial service it was announced at the trade commissioner's office to-day. Mr. Dalton said he was not at liberty to make known his new appointment but it would be made public when the announcement of his successor was made.

TARIFF CHANGES THROW FERTILIZER FACTORY OUT OF BUSINESS.

MONTREAL, April 22. A two hundred thousand dollar fertilizer factory erected two years ago is now on the market for sale at a cut price, according to statements made by a representative of the Scottish Fertilizer Ltd., of Welland Ontario, who said the company will have no option but to close down and go out of business as a result of the new tariff reductions of fertilizers. The factory was being financed by English Capital.

EARTHQUAKE IN MEXICO.

MEXICO CITY, April 22. A severe earthquake shock lasting one minute and twenty seconds rocked Mexico City and the plateau region of Mexico shortly after one o'clock this afternoon. Slight material damage was reported from various points affected by tremor. There was no confirmation of reports that there had been loss of life.

500 YEARS ADDED TO HISTORY OF JERUSALEM.

LONDON, April 22. A further discovery carrying the history of Jerusalem 500 years further than hitherto known is reported to the Daily Telegraph by Prof. Stewart MacAllister, who recently traced the ancient city of David. This latest find in the excavation of the city shows a great trench sunk in rock older than the Jebusite wall previously found and apparently formed part of the city's defences in the early period.

SQUADRON COMMANDER HELD UP BY WEATHER.

(On board United States Coast Guard Cutter Algon, U.S. Kanatak, Alaska). — Unfavorable conditions prevented Major Frederick Martin,

commanding the flight around the world by four United States Army airplanes from leaving here yesterday for Dutch Harbor, Unalaska, 500 miles southwest, where his three companions arrived last Saturday.

GOOD PROGRESS BY BRITISH AIRMEN.

BOMBAY, April 22. Stuart MacLaren, British aviator engaged in an attempt to fly around the world, arrived at Bushire, on the Persian Gulf.

THE PRINCE RETURNS AS AN ORDINARY TOURIST.

LONDON, April 22. Fully recovered from his steeplechase accident and looking well and hearty, the Prince of Wales returned to England last evening, crossing from France to Folkestone as one of the crowd of holiday makers on the regular Channel boat. The Prince mingled with the other passengers during the crossing and was given a rousing cheer when he left the boat and entered the train for London.

N.F.L.D. GRADUATES IN THEOLOGY.

TORONTO, April 22. Rev. Dr. J. T. Warile Stafford of the Metropolitan Methodist Church delivered a special address to the graduate class on the occasion of the Convocation in Divinity held at Victoria College last night. Diplomats were presented to 22 men who had graduated in Theology, among them being A. Brett, of Springdale, Nfld.; S. Edgecombe, Ochre Pit Cove, Nfld., and W. J. Morris, Red Bay, Nfld.

David C. Ricey Abandoned

CREW RESCUED BY LINER.
A wireless message received at Cape Race and forwarded to Mr. Cyril Testator, reads as follows: "Steamer Virginian, bound to New York, took off the crew of the schooner David C. Ricey in Lat. 40.10 N.; Long. 56.07 W. The Ricey was bound from New York to Roseau Bay with a cargo of coal." Considerable anxiety has recently been felt for the safety of the vessel; and although the news indicates the abandonment of the vessel, the safety of the crew will be learnt with relief.

HALF MILLION DOLLAR CUT IN ESTIMATES.

The revenue as a result will be lessened by a sum approximately a half million dollars. 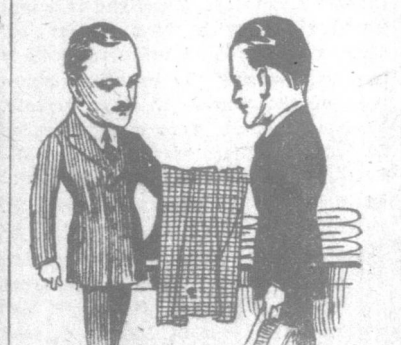
