An ambulance class has been started in Coal Creek, which will supply a long-felt want. In fact it is something that ought to be in every mining camp, above all places, for men may meet with accidents and die before reaching the doctor, whose lives may be saved by the first aid an ambulance man can render. For instance some time ago, a man at these mines had his foot cut off; had it not been for his own coolness in taking an article of his own clothing and bandaging his foot and thus stopping some of the bleeding, he would have bled to death before the arrival of the doctor. Ambulance men in such cases have saved many lives. The class promises to be a successful one, for already a good many have signified their intention of joining. Dr. Keith has been approached and has promised to give lectures on ambulance work. The president, Mr. Airy and the treasurer Mr. Milburn have gone through a three years course in England and are both bronze medalists, while the vice president, Mr. Finlayson and the secretary Mr. Featherstone have both got certificates, and there are many others in the camp who have attended a course of lectures in England so that there should soon be an efficient corps. The class will meet in the church.

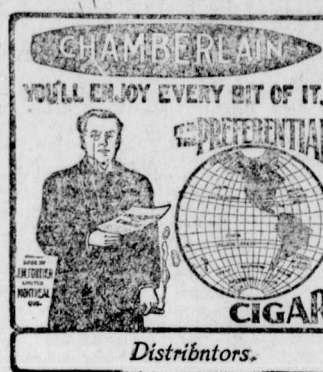
