THE WEATHER PROPHECY.

TORONTO, AUG. 21—11 a.m.—The pressure
is above the average over the Northwest Terri-
tory and below over the lake region and St.
Lawrence Valley. With the storm center men-
tioned last night near Anticosti. Rain fell
during the early morning in Ontario, and the
weather has been generally showery in Quebec
west of the St. Lawrence. A moderately south-
west gale has prevailed throughout the Mar-
time Provinces.

—The north end of the dam at Spring-
bank is undergoing extensive repairs at a
cost of about \$2,000.

—The Hamilton street and Maple avenue
drain will be commenced to-day. It
will be about half a mile long.

—Mr. and Mrs. Jupp, of London, are
spending a few holidays in our city, guests
of Prof. Tagg, (St. Catharines Star).

—Miss L. Wilson, artist, of this city,
left yesterday for a three weeks' visit to
friends in Hamilton and other cities.

—The bridge over Cawthra's Creek on
Richmond street was torn up yesterday. It
is to be replanked and raised half a foot.

—The annual meeting for 1891 of the On-
tario branch of the Dominion Alliance will
be held in Richmond Hall, Toronto, on
Tuesday, Sept. 15, commencing at 9 a.m.

—The morning train to London leaves now
at 9:40 a.m. The atmosphere between the
city and the station has been sulphuric for
some weeks, and it is accounted for by the
fact that locomotives have been running in the
First Street tunnel.

—Rev. Robert Chambers, a gentleman
who has labored for nine years as a mis-
sionary in Turkey under the auspices of
the American Congregational Board, will
preach morning and evening in the First
Congregational Church Sunday. His sub-

pointed to a position in the engineering de-
partment of the London, Huron and Bruce
Railway, and will become a resident of
this city.

—Captain Robert Dillon, our crack rifle
shot, started "on the road" on Monday.
During his absence he will participate in
several matches in connection with the
Seventh Festival of Lions, of which bat-

—Wednesday afternoon, at 3:30, at the
residence of Mr. Wm. Kerr, 644 Elias
street, a very enjoyable treat was offered a
large concourse of friends, the occasion be-
ing the marriage of his daughter, Miss
Margaret Isabel, to Mr. Geo. A. Dowling,
engineer in the C. P. R. The sixteen bond
was tied by the Rev. J. A. Hunter Murray.
The presents were very numerous and val-
uable. The happy couple left at 5:30 on the
C. P. R. for Montreal, whence they sail for
England, France, Ireland and Scotland.
Their departure was made amidst a shower
of old slippers, rice and hearty good

—Mrs. Nellie Jacoby, a middle-aged
woman, and Fanny Rogers, a girl about 19
years old, were at the Police Court yester-
day, the former charged with keeping a
house of ill-repute at 525 South street,
and the latter with being an inmate.
Evidence was given by John Kennedy, Wm.
Scott, John Grayson and Elizabeth Gray-
son, neighbors of Mrs. Jacoby, to the effect
that the character of the house was ques-
tionable. P. C. Crawford also testified to
the elder woman's bad reputation. The
Rogers girl was put in the box, but her
statement did not go to prove her inno-
cence. Mrs. Jacoby said that she had left
her husband in New York five years ago,
and had five living children. One of these,
a girl 11 years old, was with her at the
Police Court. The two women were re-
manded until next Thursday.

Death of a Famous Missionary.

Many people in London and the West
will regret to learn of the death of Rev. Dr.
Narayan Sheshadri, the well-known
missionary, word of which has just been re-
ceived. The deceased, it is learned from the
Canadian Press, who was highly esteemed
Indian missionary of the Free Church of Scotland, had not been in
good health for some time, and accordingly
had been granted leave of absence from his
post at Bethel, a Christian village, which
25 years ago he was instrumental in found-
ing in conjunction with Sir Salar Jung, the
minister of Hyderabad State. After
traveling for a fortnight in Japan, Dr.
Sheshadri was advised to try the hot
springs of Colorado. He did so, and the
result was a considerable improvement in
his health. Then he crossed the Rocky
Mountains and gradually made his way
to Canada, revisiting old friends and
pleading the mission cause en route. He
also attended the meetings of the General
Assembly at Kingston. On July 18 he
sailed in the Circassian from New York, ac-
companied by his son, who had borne him
company in his tour across the Pacific and
the American continent. He was again
taken suddenly ill, and died when the
vessel was three days out. Dr. Sheshadri
was a high caste Brahmin by birth, and yet
gave the best part of his life to the work of
evangelizing the heathen of India. The
Foreign Mission Committee of the Free
Church were aware that he needed help in
his missionary labors, and at a recent
meeting selected young Dr. Mowat, of
Glasgow, to be his colleague.
