Had no agreement been arrived at this summer, new rails, etc., would have been necessary on Pall Mall, as the line is in a very poor state of repair. The Hamilton road is the only portion of the old lines not now being operated by electricity. Cars will be

placed on it in a few days. The company has the Thames street line from York to Horton streets pretty well under way. No difficulty will be experienced in passing under the Grand Trunk's arched bridge.
