

British Grain Trade. London, May 13.—The Mark Lane Express, in its weekly review of the British grain trade, says: English wheat has been steady; the foreign wheats have declined 6d. There have been heavy shipments from Argentina and Russia. Corn has been strong at 22s 5d per quarter. Linseed and rape seed have been quarter. Linseed and rap firm and cotton seed quiet.

Today English wheats are 6d dearer and foreign wheat a turn lower. American and Russian wheats are firm, and Chilian, Argentine and Californian wheats are selling at about last week's prices. All of them are unchanged except Duluth, which is quoted at 27s 6d. Corn and barley rose 3d. Flour and oats are unchanged and beans and peas dull.

On 'Change. Special to C. E. Turner, broker, Masonic Temple, from Kennett, Hopkins

Company. Chicago, May 13.-The selling by a prominent commission house held the market down in the early part of the day. The heavy exports from Russia and large increase on passage induced some short selling. The wheat was absorbed, but by whom it would be hard to say. There is no mistake about this being a bull market. Another large decrease in the visible supply leaves it nearly 4,000,000 bushels less than a year ago, and more than 13,000,000 smaller than two years ago. Stocks of wheat at other winter markets are getting dangerously small, and other points are reaching out for Chicago wheat. It is said shippers have taken a liberal amount of wheat and corn today. There is a possibility of severe frosts tonight in the winter wheat States, which certainly would damage the plant. Corn and Oats-Increasing receipts of corn have had a bearish influence on that grain. Near the close the market advanced moderately in sympathy with wheat, but the tone was rather heavy for both corn and oats. Provisions—Featureless
