PASSENGERS' STORY. "When we left Sarnia, the purse was overheard to say to Capt. Hill that he had better wait until morning be fore venturing out into the lake, but evidently the captain did not agree with the purser, and the boat started on her trip. On reaching the lake, the the captain pushed on. On the way up the lakes, a raft of logs was passed in safety. After going about ten miles out into the lake, the captain changed his mind, and turned the boat around and started back toward Sarnia. "By this time most of the passen-gers had turned in, and only a few were on deck. Shortly after 1 o'clock the boat struck a drift of logs, and a nole was made in her bow, the logs linging to the boat, and completely surrounding her. In attempting to back out of the logs, the steamer's
