At a distance of 600 miles from Hawaii it settled upon the surface of the sea, and was then carried back by the northeast wind to its place of origin, where it arrived a fortnight after its original departure, and covered the entire group of islands with its heavy pall.

The Unexpected Will Happen

Lord Roberts Is Not Advertising His Programme.

Correspondents in the Meanwhile Air Their Own Theories Regarding the Anticipated British Advance—Gen. Clements Advancing to Bloemfontein—Boers Massing at Biggarsberg—Apparent Escape of Gen. Olivier and His 25 Miles of Wagons.

London, March 28—4 a.m.—Spencer Wilkinson, in the Morning Post, says: There is nothing to indicate the early move of the main forces in either theater of war. When it comes it will be unexpected, for Lord Roberts is not in the habit of announcing his movements in advance. The latest telegrams give grounds for a hopeful view as to Mafeking, and suggest the likelihood that Commandant Olivier's force will make good its retreat. The opinion telegraphed is that the Boers at Ladybrand were covering the retirement of their convoy toward Seneka, 60 miles north. If the convoy has escaped the commandos can scarcely be preventing from retreating. Small parties it is next to impossible to stop. It is given out at Cape Town that Lord Roberts' advance may be delayed for a month. Although such statements should be received with reserve, it seems positive that he intends to go to Cape Town to meet Lady Roberts, who is due to arrive there in ten days. The Cape Town correspondent of the Daily News, telegraphing on Tuesday, March 27, says it is improbable that the advance from Bloemfontein will be made for another month. Gen. Clements is advancing to Bloemfontein in four columns. When Lord Roberts begins the march northward, Gen. Gattard will be left in charge of Bloemfontein. The colonial government has ordered the Cape Volunteers to withdraw south of the Orange River, for fear of accentuating racial feeling. BRITISH LOSSES. The war office has issued another table of British losses, showing an aggregate of 16,852, which does not include 4,000 who have been invalided home. EX-COMMANDANT ARRESTED. A dispatch to the Daily Telegraph from Bloemfontein, dated Monday, says: The Transvaalers have arrested Commandant Prinsloo, who had their pass (permit), but had neglected to appear at the military post at Bloemfontein, wishing to enjoy peace under British rule. A Warrenton dispatch of the 26th says: The movements of the Boers on the Orange River have been very active in finding range in order to shell the British camp, which moved during the night. The Boers kept up a steady smashing. The railway line is clear, and an armored train arrived here today. BRITISH TROOPS CHEERED BY FREE STATERS. Gen. Clements' column occupied Jagersfontein and Fauresmith Tuesday, and are showing some boldness again, enthusiasm, and without opposition. The British troops were warmly cheered, and Union Jacks are now flying everywhere. The Boer Commander Steinkamp is at Uplington, with 800 men. A British advance on Uplington has been ordered. RAIDING A RAILWAY.
