Young Filipino at Manila Says the Rebel Leader is Dead.

San Diego, Cal., Nov. 5.—James C. Husey, of National City, has received a letter from James Thompson, a private of company C, 24th United States Infantry, written while he was in the hospital at Manila, and dated Sept. 1, in which the writer says a young Filipino, occupying a bed next to him at the hospital, stated that Aguinaldo was really shot dead, as reported some time ago, but that it was to be kept quiet for political reasons.

OUTLOOK FOR TRADE BRIGHT

Weekly Review of the Business Situation in Canada.

Toronto, Nov. 3.—Bradstreet's trade review weekly summary: Cooker weather at Montreal this week has in some extent stimulated wholesale trade, and with a further drop in the temperature there will be increased activity in seasonable goods.

Trade at Toronto has in some cases been retarded by the backward season, heavy winter lines still being slow, and a change in the temperature to colder weather will be gladly welcomed in trade circles.

At Hamilton there has been a fair movement in fall goods, and large shipments have been made this week. Labor is well employed, and the reports from travelers are very encouraging, and promise a much larger movement when the weather turns colder.

At Winnipeg trade has been showing a little more activity. Thrashing operations have been proceeding more steadily in the wheat fields, and the grain deliveries have been larger. Collections are slow, and there is a good demand for money.

Business at London is improving. The grain deliveries are more free, and country trade is looking up. Travelers are sending forward numerous orders. The outlook for trade is bright.

NEW YORK CLEARANCES. The bank clearances for the week in the Dominion of Canada were as follows: Montreal, \$14,046,408, decrease 5.3 per cent; Toronto, \$9,895,808, decrease 9.0 per cent; Winnipeg, \$2,344,427, decrease 85.4 per cent; Halifax, \$1,670,412, decrease 15.6 per cent; Hamilton, \$688,552, decrease 22.6 per cent; St. John, N.B., \$658,592, increase 11.7 per cent; Vancouver, \$1,150,706; Victoria, \$627,552, decrease 13.9 per cent.
