Very Sudden Death. A very sudden death occurred yesterday afternoon about 5 o'clock at the woodyard of Mr. John G. Orchard, York street. Early yesterday morning he arose and was engaged working around his home during the forenoon. About 11 o'clock he went to Mr. Orchard seeking employment, and was told to start at lo'clock. Mr. Taylor returned home, ate a hearty dinner and started to work at the hour named. He helped for a time in unloading a car of coal, and then started to work at the sawing machine. He had been engaged in this latter occupation for some time throwing the blocks away, when, about 5 o'clock, his mate notired him suddenly reel and fall. At first it was thought that Mr. Taylor had been attacked with a fainting spell, and he was carried into the office. Drs. Waugh and Wilson were passing at the time and were called in. They pronounced him dead, the result of a sick triend, and when the sad news was broken to her she was distracted with grief. Deceased was born in Nottingham, Eng., about 63 years ago.
