Very Sudden Death.
A very sudden death occurred yesterday afternoon about 5 o'clock at the woodyard of Mr. John G. Orchard, York street. He had been engaged in this latter occupation for some time throwing the blocks away, when, about 5 o'clock, his mate noticed him suddenly reel and fall. At first it was thought that Mr. Taylor had been attacked with a fainting spell, and he was carried into the office. Drs. Vaughn and Wilson were called in at the time and were called in. They pronounced him dead, the result of heart disease. The body was then removed to his home, where it now lies awaiting interment. When the body was removed home Mrs. Taylor was waiting on a sick friend, and when the sad news was broken to her she was distracted with grief. Deceased was born in Nottingham, Eng., about 63 years ago. He came to this country 40 years ago and settled in Brussels, Ont., seeing that now thriving town grew up from a backwoods settlement of two or three houses. Afterwards he resided in Tuckersmith and Clinton, finally removing to this city about eleven years ago. Here he has resided ever since, and was looked upon by all who knew him as an industrious, respectable citizen. There are left to mourn his loss seven children—four boys and three girls—mostly grown up. Of these three daughters and one son, Fred, reside at home.
