THE WEST BOOMING

Prospects for a Magnificent Harvest in Manitoba and the Territories—Some Danger by Rust and Heat.

Toronto, Aug. 1.—The Globe says: Mr. T. C. Irving, manager of Bradstreet's, returned to Toronto yesterday after a month's trip through Manitoba, the Territories, and British Columbia. Mr. Irving, in an interview with a Globe reporter, expressed his firm belief in the performance and the marvelous fertility of the west. The reports published here of the abundance of the Manitoba wheat crop he found, upon inquiry among the most practical and hard-headed buyers, to be well founded. The crop is estimated at from 40,000,000 to 65,000,000 bushels for sale, netting the farmer 50 cents a bushel, so that, at the lowest estimate, it all goes well, the comparatively small number of farmers in the west will divide among themselves \$20,000,000.

In Manitoba he met a prominent director of one of the largest eastern loan companies, who explained that he was looking over the west, as his company would probably have more than half its money loaned out there this year.

In British Columbia Mr. Irving found the people to be hopeful and enthusiastic in their love for the province. Things were quiet, but in Victoria the business men felt that the place was really in better shape than a year ago, as a number of concerns of a speculative character had been wiped out, and more healthy conditions had been established.

At Roseland business was exceedingly dull owing to the miners' strike, which involves 1,200 men, and the result of which is uncertain. The strike appeared to Mr. Irving to be partly one of sympathy with strikers at Northport, but its immediate effect on Roseland has been disastrous, as these men have been getting from \$2 to \$3 a day, and that money was freely distributed among the merchants. The miners had little saved, so that now they had nothing to spend.

The canners, Mr. Irving found, expect an immense catch this season, as this is a "fourth year," and the catch has been found to be uniformly good every fourth year. It will probably run to \$2,500,000 this year, notwithstanding the strike, which was settled the night before Mr. Irving left the coast.

Altogether, he was very strongly impressed with the prospects for a good year, for many good years, in the west.

ANOTHER VIEW.

Toronto, Aug. 1.—D. O. Ellis, Toronto agent of the Northern Elevator Company, up to last night at eight o'clock had advised from the company which estimated that the Manitoba wheat crop would reach 60,000,000 bushels, but this morning he received the following dispatch: "Crop damaged by rust and heat. Estimate now 42,000,000 bushels. There will be lots of shrunken grain."

Potato famine prevails around Waterbury, Conn., and tubers bring \$5 per barrel.

New York's rapid transit tunnel is one-quarter dug, and may be done in the spring of 1903.

Mr. and Mrs. Burr Ferguson, of New York, were robbed of \$3,000 worth of diamonds in Colorado Springs, Col., Wednesday night.

The customs returns for Hamilton for July show receipts amounting to \$2,900, compared with \$54,577 for same month last year.

Tea growers of Japan talk of controlling the market for Japanese teas, by limiting the supply, and are about to form a producers' trust.

The automobile service of the Toronto postoffice has been extended to the collections of all mails in the various branch offices in the city.

Thieves swiped jewelry worth \$5,000 from Mrs. Robert Adams, aged 20, of Spring Valley, N. Y. Her husband of a week was absent at the time.

The Murphy 20, bride of a week, white, has eloped from Middletown, Conn., with Tom Sparks, mulatto, who leaves a wife and two children to celebrate his loss.

A college for washerwomen has been opened in New York by the charity organization society. The course is 12 daily lessons, and the students receive 60 cents a day and luncheon.

It is learned that the Regina and the Lake of the Woods district mine has changed hands, the Black Eagle Gold Mining Company of London, England, taking hold of it.

Nearly 400 women are acting as pharmacists in the United States. One large drug shop in New England employs women almost exclusively, giving them precedence over men.

W. W. Moore, lawyer, died in New York, worth \$100,000. His will left \$60,000 to Ida Roberts, a Denver widow, who once nursed him when he was "broke" and friendless.

Rita L. De Ruiz, widow of the American dentist killed by Spanish soldiers in Cuba, just before the Spanish war, has filed before the Spanish claims in Washington a claim for \$75,000.

Governor Odell demands that New York state hospitals spend at least \$500,000 a year less. The state has \$23,000,000 invested in hospitals, and Odell has discovered a lot of extravagances.

John Paski, 5, in Elizabethport, jealous, set fire to the crib in which his baby brother, 5 months old, was sleeping. The child's mother rescued the baby, but not before it was badly burned.

The British cruiser Adraide, held the coal record by taking on 203 tons of coal in one hour. The cargo was taken on this record at Pensacola, by taking 219 tons; the Alabama, 222 tons, and the Massachusetts 248 tons.

Three hundred and fifty-two births, 241 marriages and 301 deaths were recorded at Toronto city clerk's office in July. The birth of the month were 127 less than those of July last year. There were 84 more marriages than last July. The death rate is about the same.

Miss Caro G. Leigh, of Nashua, N.H., a member of the stock company which is playing in the summer theater at Cape Elizabeth, was to have sung in the Chestnut Street Methodist Church in Portland, Me., Sunday, but the church official board vetoed the proposal.

ENTRIES FOR TORONTO

Last Day for Live Stock Is Tomorrow—The Premier and the Fair.

Toronto, Aug. 2.—The greatest satisfaction is felt here at the fact that Sir Wilfrid Laurier will open the fair on Tuesday, Aug. 21, Secretary Stratton and other members of the Local Government will also take part in the dedication ceremonies. At least one other member will accompany Sir Wilfrid to Toronto, and Lady Laurier is expected.

Arrangements for the exhibition of horses, cattle, sheep, swine, dairy products, honey, manufactures, fine arts and ladies' work close tomorrow, Saturday, Aug. 3.

Arrangements have been made for displays of artillery exercises, lyddite firing and maxim firing, also for a series of cavalry evolutions. An automobile race from Buffalo to Toronto is talked of. Experiments will be made in telegraphic photography.

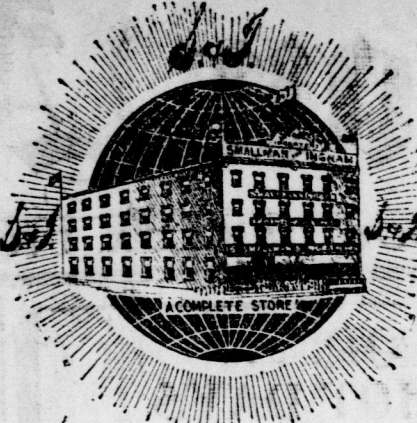
