

Brother of Rev. John Ten Eyck Passed Away Yesterday.

Ald. M. H. TenEyck died at the city hospital at 12:30 yesterday after the briefest sort of an illness from appendicitis, says the Hamilton Spectator, which adds:

Ald. TenEyck was one of the best

and most favorably known of Hamilton's citizens who have served the city in the council. He went into the council first in 1892, and in that and the next year was chairman of the hospi-tal committee. In 1894 he was out of the council, but was elected again in 1895, and in the years 1896, 1897 and 1898 was chairman of the sewers committee, holding that position when the sewage disposal works were introduced. In 1899 he was chairman of finance, continuing in this position over the next year. In 1901 he ran as a mayoralty candidate, being defeated in a three-cornered fight with Mayor Hendrie and Ald. Findlay as his opponents. Last January he again offered himself as an aldermanic candidate and was elected from the city
