### STOCK MARKETS.

#### NOON ADVICES.

New York, Oct. 30.—Although London houses were selected at the opening, the market quickly developed a rallying tendency, due partly to covering by traders and partly to a cessation of the liquidation which caused yesterday's decline. The recoveries were naturally most marked in the stocks such as St. P. and Mo. Pac., which were the heaviest yesterday. Mo. Pac. was bought by Butler & Bro., while St. P. advanced, the expectation being that at today's meeting an issue of \$10,000,000 of stock at par to stockholders will be authorized. Well-to-do traders were credited with having covered a good many stocks during the first hour and there was some bidding up of stocks by a room trader, who is supposed to have covered his shorts yesterday and to be anxious to put them out again at higher figures. Apathy characterized the market after the first hour, but the prices were well maintained, and there was still no pressure to sell.

NOTES.

It looks as if Texas Pacific and Missouri Pacific were being accumulated. The banks have gained from Friday's recovery \$75,000 net since last Friday. Union Pacific net earnings for September increased \$234,000.

# DIGGING OUT DUSKY DIAMONDS

General Resumption of Mining—Large Output for Today—Mitchell Busy.

Wilkesbarre, Pa., Oct. 30.—There was a general resumption of coal mining today. All the mines in operation are capable of turning out more coal now than last week, and a large output is looked for today.

President Mitchell is busy at headquarters compiling statistics for presentation to the arbitration commission when he is called upon. He said he did not expect to go to Scranton today.

The various companies of the Fourth and Eighth Regiments are leaving the region for home.

ON THE JUMP.

Windsor, Ont., Oct. 30.—Customs officers and railway men at the Windsor Central, the Grand Trunk and the Windsor and Detroit, have been kept on the jump for the past two days handling the anthracite coal shipments to Eastern Ontario points.

# STRIKE RENEWED IN SEVERAL MINES

By District Secretary, Under Mitchell's Orders—Dozen Collieries Affected.

Hazleton, Pa., Oct. 30.—The strike at the seven collieries of Cox & Co., and the four mines of G. B. Markle & Co., and the Silver Brook operation of J. Wint & Co., was officially renewed today, on an order issued by District Secretary Gallagher, of the United Mine Workers, upon instructions from President Mitchell.

The strikers at these mines were not permitted to return to work in a body. The Coxes insisted that their employees must make personal application for their former positions, and G. B. Markle & Co. required that each man, before going back to work, must promise to abide by the decision of the arbitration commission.

The mine workers allege that the object of these requirements is discrimination against men who were prominent in the strike.

A. Bardee & Co.'s collieries, where the men have been asked not to interfere with non-union hands, are not included in the strike order.

The men voted on Saturday not to resume work until the agreement is withdrawn.
