CANADA THE OUTLET

Lord Brassey Wants to Send English Unemployed to Dominion.

London, Feb. 17.—Lord Brassey, president of a meeting of the Charity Organization Society, said the ideal of the statesman of the future should be able to find outlets for the surplus millions of populations; that ideal would best be realized by affording the unemployed facilities for going to Canada, and in that way creating a large number of capable citizens of the Empire. The Bishop of Stepney strongly condemned any proposal to migrate the unemployed from the east end of London to Canada. He declared they have neither brain nor muscle nor tenacity of character to contribute to any industry in which they might be engaged; the majority of them would be as unemployable in Canada as they were in the east end.

The Globe correspondent at Sydney says: 'The Laborites are indulging in big talk respecting what they intend doing and the possibility of forming a labor ministry. On the subject of preferential trade the Labor party, both in state and commonwealth, is hopelessly divided, the Socialist section being generally in favor of the importation of manufactured goods, whether of British origin or otherwise.'

The Westminster Gazette, referring to Lord Londonderry's refusal to reduce the postage on newspapers from Canada, says: 'Certainly there seems no reason why a preferential postal tariff should be created in favor of Canada alone.'

The promoters of the Imperial Floating Exhibition have chartered the Lake Megantic. The steamer leaves London on April 27.

ONE EYE ON INDIA. Russians in Turkestan Prepare for a Military Invasion.

St. Petersburg, Feb. 17.—Lieut.-General Ivanoff, governor-general and commander of troops in Turkestan, has gone to Tashkent with General Skrydloff, chief of the staff of the military district of Turkestan.

It is said in high military circles that General Ivanoff has been instructed to prepare for the contingency of military action in the direction of India in the event of Great Britain adopting an attitude of openly hostile to Russia, or attempting to prejudice Russian interests in Persia or Tibet.

Public opinion in Russia is even among the military men strongly opposed to Viceroy Alexief, who is accused of incapacity. A movement is on foot in the ranks of the immediate appointment of General Kuropatkin, the war minister, to command the Russian land forces, and to give Admiral Skrydloff command on the sea.

WESTERN HOLD UP. Lake City, Colorado, Feb. 16.—The stage which runs between Lake City and Sapinero has been held up by masked men, and the registered mail bag filled. As this is payday at the mines in this vicinity, it is believed considerable money was secured by the robbers, who escaped. A sheriff's posse has gone in pursuit of them.
