RAILWAYS HEARD ON 2 CENT RATE

Says Mr. Maclean's Proposal Would Be an Injustice.

Maclean's bill to reduce the maximum passenger rate on Canadian railways. at three cents a mile, was under con-His original proposal was to fix the but Mr. Maclean changed this so as to bring it into conformity with the rates enforced in Michigan, which range from three down to two cents. Under this law, roads earning \$3,000 a mile from the passenger business are re-

quired to give a two-cent rate; where the earnings are less than \$3,000 and more than \$2,000 the rate is two and a half cents. Where the earnings are ess than \$2,000 the companies are free to charge three cents.

Mr. Maclean urged that the reduction of the rates on American roads had resulted in largely increasing the earnings of the companies, and promised that the same thing would happen in Canada.
