

FIERCE FIGHTING IN ALGERIA ARABS STORM FRENCH CAMP

Lalla Maghia, Algeria, Nov. 25.—Ten thousand of the fiercest Bonis Nasen tribesmen swooped down on the French camp yesterday and were beaten off with a loss of 1,200 killed. At one time the French infantry were in danger of being surrounded, but they finally disengaged themselves from their perilous position by a most

brilliant charge of the Spahis. The rout of the Arabs was completed by vigorous shelling by the artillery. The Arabs were not discouraged by this severe repulse, but reformed their forces, and in addition directed their efforts to rousing other tribes. The fighting was resumed today and the booming of cannon could be heard throughout the afternoon.

MRS. BRADLEY INSANE

Was Not Responsible for Action When She Killed Senator Brown.

Washington, Nov. 25.—That Mrs. Annie M. Bradley was insane at the time she shot former Senator Arthur Brown, of Utah, in this city, on Dec. last, was the opinion of Dr. W. M. Barton, of the medical department of Georgetown University, and a specialist in nervous diseases, expressed at the trial of Mrs. Bradley today. Dr. Barton's testimony followed the reading of a hypothetical question of 1,300 words, covering the history of Mrs. Bradley's relations with Senator Brown.

Dr. Barton diagnosed Mrs. Bradley's ailment as puerperal insanity, caused by the continued assaults upon her nervous system, due to the abortions which she had had performed upon her. In explaining why he looked upon her as an abnormal woman, he said she was interested in things that do not usually attract women, and instanced the fact that she was secretary of a political club as an evidence of her abnormality. Dr. Barton was in the stand practically the entire day. His testimony was unshaken.

THEIR RELEASE ASKED.

Ottawa, Nov. 25.—Emmanuel Devlin, M. P.; F. A. Gendron, H. A. Goyette, K. C., and others, waited on Sir Wilfrid Laurier this morning and asked for the release of the Buckingham strikers, who were sent down for two months because they were implicated in the riots in that place. The chief reason given was that the prisoners' families were suffering because they are unable to provide for them.

a hall over a driving shed in Lucan, in the township of Biddulph, at which both political parties were represented. Mr. (now Sir John) Carling and others came from London, as part of the Conservative contingent, while the Government had when the House was dissolved was, by the result of the elections, reduced to seven, which would have been a good working majority for Sandfield had they continued a compact body in his support. But the result of the elections had satisfied some of his supporters that the outlook was not assuring, and the muscular tension about the knees of a few of them began to relax, and they assigned various reasons for not being as warm and ardent supporters of the Government since the election as they had been before it. There were a few of the Conservative members, like Albert Prince, of Essex, who had no personal regard for Sandfield Macdonald, yet supported the Government. They considered that Sandfield's horizon as a political leader was lamentably contracted; that he was difficult to deal with; and was possessed of a petty and vindictive spirit, which would soon destroy him as well as the party he led.

Mr. Scott's Position.

With the conditions then existing it was a matter of moment as to which side could secure the nomination of the speaker and the opposition was desirous of nominating Mr. R. W. Scott (now Senator Scott). But, as he had been elected member for the city of Ottawa in the Conservative interest, and as a supporter of Sandfield Macdonald's Government, he thought

the offer of the speakership should come from his own side. When the House met on Dec. 7, 1871, Mr. Scott was nominated by Sandfield Macdonald, and, there being no opposition, he became speaker. A few days thereafter the Government was defeated on two motions made in reply to the address, when the Hon. E. B. Wood resigned office as provincial treasurer.

Amongst those who voted against the ministry were such well-known Conservatives as Boulton, Deacon, Grange, Merrick and Prince. Mr. E. B. Wood also voted against his former colleagues. The Government immediately resigned, and Mr. Blake was called upon to form a ministry, and great was the surprise of the country to learn that Mr. Scott, who resigned the speakership, was included in the ministry as commissioner of crown lands.

Diseases and Missionaries Responsible Says Dundee Whaler.

John W. Murray, Dundee, refutes the allegation that whalers are responsible for the extermination of the Eskimo in Ungava. He spent nine years there and says the great cause of death is a disease resembling cholera, which does not affect the white men. He adds that the action of missionaries in drawing the natives together is responsible for the latter's loss of hunting skill, for when game in the immediate neighborhood is gone the Eskimo, knowing food is assured, decline to go any distance for it.
